EXECUTIVE Summary

Manitoba Opera's 2018/19 season was by turns thought provoking and light hearted. *Don Giovanni* followed the master manipulator as he wooed and discarded women until the moment of his fiery judgment, while *The Barber of Seville*, with Figaro and his wily schemes, was a breath of fresh spring air.

Don Giovanni as a charming Lothario undergoes a sea-change in the #MeToo era - we see not a charming rake, but a serial abuser. Daniel Okulitch took on this challenging character with aplomb; his portrayal of an entitled man limned in violence was spot-on. Stephen Hegedus as Leporello provided a comic foil and several

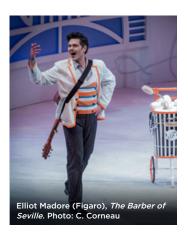

much-needed laughs. Jessica Strong, Owen McCausland, and Monica Huisman were outstanding as Donna Anna, Don Ottavio, and Donna Elvira, respectively. And Andrea Lett as Zerlina was luminous in her Manitoba Opera debut.

A counterpoint to the serious themes in *Don Giovanni* was April's fun-filled production of *The Barber of Seville*. With his megawatt smile and swaggering delivery, Elliot Madore commanded the

stage as Figaro. Andrew Owens was hilarious as Count Almaviva, Andrea Hill played for laughs as Rosina, and Steven Condy was a comedic gem as Bartolo.

A very successful drive for personal care products was held in conjunction with this production. A van-load of toiletries donated by patrons was gratefully received by Lighthouse Mission, Siloam Mission, and Main Street Project.









September 13, 2018 marked the launch of Manitoba Opera's Gail Asper Award, named for its inaugural recipient. At a gala reception, the company honoured Ms. Asper for her contributions to arts and culture in Canada. Subsequent honorees will be chosen because they, like Ms. Asper, show vision, determination, and leadership in pursuit of a goal or achievement.

Mid-year, an unexpected opportunity arose in the form of a generous gift from a private donor. Seeking to eliminate the company's long-standing debt, the donor pledged \$1 for every \$2 we raised, to a maximum of \$100,000. Fundraising efforts were so robust that a subsequent gift of \$50,000 was made by the same donor, to be matched dollar-for-dollar. As a result, Manitoba Opera has eliminated a debt that has existed for more than three decades.

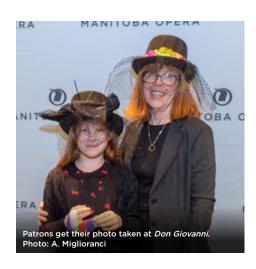

Last season we broke all Manitoba Opera fundraising records when we exceeded \$900,000 in contributed income and special events. This season we surpassed even that milestone with \$1,236,000 in fundraising revenue. ARTISTIC PROGRAMMING

MANITOBA OPERA'S 46TH SEASON FEATURED VISUALLY INVENTIVE AND RE-IMAGINED VERSIONS OF TWO OF OPERA'S MOST POPULAR WORKS.

The season began in November with a stark and contemporary production of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's classic tale of seduction and damnation, *Don Giovanni*.

Originally conceived and directed by Spanish-born and Québecbased director Oriol Tomas, the production was updated to an unspecified mid-20th century look and feel. It was originally constructed for and by Edmonton Opera with set design by Bretta Gerecke and costumes by Deanna Finnman. Winnipeg-based designer Scott Henderson provided the lighting design. Tyrone Paterson, Manitoba Opera's Music Advisor and Principal Conductor, led the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra and Tadeusz Biernacki, Manitoba Opera's Assistant Music Director and Chorus Master, prepared the 20-voice Manitoba Opera Chorus.

The cast was led by Canadian bass-baritone Daniel Okulitch as the ill-fated Don Giovanni. Toronto-based bass-baritone Stephen Hegedus made his company debut as Leporello, Don Giovanni's valet and sidekick.

The trio of women who bring about the Don's ultimate fiery demise were sung by three Manitoba artists: Monica Huisman as Donna Elvira, with both Jessica Strong (Donna Anna) and Andrea Lett (Zerlina) making strong company debuts. Tenor Owen McCausland

(Don Ottavio), baritone Johnathon Kirby (Masetto), and bass Kirk Eichelberger (The Commendatore), rounded out the principal cast.

In April, Manitoba Opera returned to the Concert Hall stage with a witty and well-received production of Gioachino Rossini's classic comedy, *The Barber of Seville*. The production was staged by Montréal director Alain Gauthier, who previously directed *La Traviata* in April 2018. The updated and visually appealing production (originally conceived by Morris Panych - with set design by Ken MacDonald and costumes by Dana Osborne) was provided by Pacific Opera Victoria. Winnipegger Bill Williams was







the lighting designer. Once again, Tyrone Paterson led the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra and Tadeusz Biernacki prepared the 16-voice Manitoba Opera Men's Chorus.

The production featured a number of impressive company debuts:
Canadian baritone Elliot Madore as Figaro the barber, Canadian mezzo-soprano Andrea Hill as Rosina, Chicago-based tenor Andrew Owens as Count Almaviva, and Philadelphia's Steven Condy as Dr. Bartolo. Canadian bass Giles Tomkins made a welcome return to our stage as Don Basilio, as did local artists Andrea Lett (Berta) and David Watson (Fiorello). Chorus member Michal Kowalik appeared as An Officer.

Manitoba Opera is proud of the relationships it has developed over the years with many of North America's finest artists. The company offers exciting opportunities for both established and emerging artists to continue the development of their craft, and Manitoba Opera's Production Department strives to create an environment where these artists are able to do their best work. Manitoba Opera is honoured to welcome these artists to the company, and to bring these great stories - told through beautiful music - to life on our stage.

Manitoba Opera is committed to reaching beyond the Centennial Concert Hall stage and contributing to our city and province in a variety of ways that are not always directly related to a season production. Through its community engagement activities, the company reaches out to new groups and individuals, provides context to the operas performed each season, and discusses issues that have relevance to our 21st century lives. Through these initiatives, a wide range of people are touched by the work of the organization.

Each season, the company collaborates with individuals, organizations, and agencies to develop its community engagement activities and initiatives, almost all of which are free. In 2018/19, over 3,000 people attended or participated in these activities.

OPERA ACCESS PROGRAM

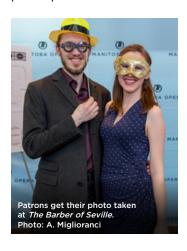
Each season Manitoba Opera donates tickets to be used by social service agencies for clients who might not otherwise be able to attend a performance.

In 2018/19, Manitoba Opera distributed 240 complimentary tickets (154 *Don Giovanni*; 86 *The Barber of Seville*). The 19 organizations receiving tickets included African Communities of Manitoba Inc., Girl Guides, Macdonald Youth Services, Urban Circle Training Centre, and West Broadway Youth Outreach.

There were also over 70 ticket donations made to various fundraising activities in the city.

OPERA PRIMER

Opera Primer is a one-hour lecture that helps prepare audiences to get the most out of their night at the opera. Context for the opera is provided through historical background on its creation and premiere, information on the composer, and DVD clips of key moments in the opera.





Opera Primers this year were presented by Winnipeg music expert Don Anderson and held at the University of St. Boniface theatre on Sunday, November 18 (Don Giovanni) and Sunday, March 31 (The Barber of Seville).

UNDERSTANDING THE MUSIC

Understanding the Music is a one-hour presentation that delves into the music and the composer's approach, provides historical and social context, and features music and DVD excerpts.

Dr. James Maiello, Associate Professor of Musicology, University of Manitoba, Desautels Faculty of Music, presented the lecture for Don Giovanni on Saturday, November 10, at Canadian Mennonite University, Laudamus Auditorium.

PRE-SHOW CHAT

For every production, a 20-minute lecture on the opera is held a half-hour before curtain at each performance. This year's guest speaker for both productions was Sarah Jo Kirsch, soprano and contemporary dramatic vocalist.

SIT IN ON THE SITZ

Donors of \$100 or more are invited to enjoy a sneak peek of the upcoming production by attending the sitzprobe (the first rehearsal in which the singers and orchestra are together) and a conversation about the production with the general director and the stage director.

This season's conversations were led by Larry Desrochers, General Director & CEO, with Oriol Thomas, director of Don Giovanni, on Tuesday, November 20, and The Barber of Seville's director, Alain Gauthier, on Tuesday, April 2.

SENIORS SUMMER CONCERT SERIES

Throughout the summer of 2018, mezzo-soprano Laurelle Czaplinski and pianist Julianne Dick performed for enthusiastic audiences at 14 retirement and assisted living residences in Winnipeg, presenting a concert series entitled "Summer Dreams." Repertoire included selections from favourite Broadway hits, familiar folk songs, and art songs by such composers as Debussy and Fauré. Locations included Deer Lodge Centre, Lindenwood Manor, Portsmouth Retirement Centre, and Concordia Village.

FILM SCREENING: IN SEARCH OF MOZART

In Search of Mozart is a documentary that explores Mozart's life and music through his correspondence, dispelling many myths about the composer. A free screening of this film was held at Cinematheque on Saturday, October 27.

LECTURE: THE SEXUAL POLITICS OF DON GIOVANNI

Metropolitan Opera writer, producer, and on-air commentator Will Berger returned to Winnipeg this season to present a lecture exploring gender and power dynamics. This look at the psychology and philosophy of this opera and what it may have to teach a 21st century audience was presented at the Canadian Museum for Human Rights, Sunday, November 4.

PRESENTATION: BEHIND THE CURTAIN

Glimpses of backstage life and drama from San Francisco Opera to The Met were shared by Will Berger at a presentation held backstage in the wings at the Centennial Concert Hall, Monday, November 5.

A TRAUMA-INFORMED APPROACH TO THE ARTS

Sometimes the subject matter in an opera can be intense or triggering for a patron, bringing up a range of sometimes unsettling feelings. Anticipating that *Don Giovanni's* subject matter could act as a trigger for some audience members, Manitoba Opera partnered with Klinic Community Health to provide trauma-related information and resources to patrons.

The program, distributed free of charge at performances, featured a comprehensive article provided by Klinic Community Health on presenting and experiencing the arts in a trauma-informed way. Representatives from that organization were also present in the lobby before curtain, during intermission, and after the performance to answer questions and to remind us that while our response to trauma is deeply individual, it does not need to be solitary.

FLAMENCO DANCE DEMONSTRATION

At the intermission of each performance of *Don Giovanni*, dancers from the Spanish Club of Winnipeg treated patrons to a live demonstration of flamenco dancing on the Piano Nobile, accompanied by flamenco guitarist Philippe Meunier.

LECTURE: GAUDÍ AND ART NOUVEAU

On Tuesday, March 26, at the Carol Shields Auditorium in the Millennium Library, Jeffrey Thorsteinson, Architectural Historian with the Winnipeg Architecture Foundation, presented a lecture on Art Nouveau and the works of Antoni Gaudí, the most celebrated Spanish architect of the 20th century. The set design for this season's production of *The Barber of Seville* was inspired by the organic configuration of shapes and lines that characterized the Art Nouveau style.

OPERA IN A TRUNK

Now at the end of its ninth season, Opera in a Trunk is a program for K-6 that provides classroom resources at no cost. The trunks are designed to be used in a way that enhances classroom learning, connecting opera to many of the core subjects that children study. Trunks are themed around six operas: The Magic Flute, Hansel & Gretel, Aida, La Bohème, Carmen, and The Daughter of the Regiment. Each trunk contains

a treasure trove of opera story books, study guides, DVDs, music CDs, hands-on music and drama classroom activities, costumes, props, and musical instruments. This year approximately 1,200 students at 15 schools in Manitoba (Winnipeg, Gimli, and St. Anne) had the opportunity to experience Opera in a Trunk.

OPERA CLASS

Opera Class is a 45-minute workshop led by an opera singer (presenters for the 2018/2019 season were mezzo-soprano Laurelle Czaplinski and baritone Nathan Sawatzky-Dyck). Students learn about what opera is, who makes it happen, and how it all comes together to tell powerful stories. Each workshop engages students in hands-on learning, as

they use song, dance, costumes, props, and acting to perform their very own miniature opera mash-up!

This season our presenters went beyond the perimeter, bringing Opera Class to students in Gimli, Elie, and Tyndall. In total, 18 workshops were presented at nine schools, serving approximately 550 students in grades K-6.







SCHOOL TOUR SPONSORSHIP UNIVERSITY OF MANITOBA **OPERA THEATRE**

As part of its commitment to promoting the development of opera and opera artists in our province, Manitoba Opera is proud to work with and support the Opera Theatre program at the University of Manitoba's Desautels Faculty of Music. In May, U of M Opera Theatre produced Angela and her Sisters, a one-act opera composed by Dean Burry. Manitoba Opera assisted with the development of marketing materials for the project, as well as communication with the schools, and booking of performances.

Over 350 students from Ralph Maybank School and Buchanan School attended performances presented in the new Vocal Ensemble Room at the University of Manitoba.

DISCOVER OPERA

I LOVE TO READ MONTH

February is "I Love to Read Month" in Winnipeg schools; Manitoba Opera participated by bringing an opera singer into elementary school classrooms to engage students' imaginations through a reading of *Opera Cat*, vocal activities, and a short performance. Students even learned a little bit of Italian! This year, mezzo-soprano Laurelle Czaplinski visited five schools and presented to over 300 students.

For the sixth year in a row, Manitoba Opera participated in the Seven Oaks School Division's Balanced Experiential Education Program (B.E.E.P). Soprano Lara Ciekiewicz and mezzo-soprano Susanne Reimer facilitated 10 workshops, introducing opera to 600 students. Students in grades 1-8 participated in singing exercises, music activities, and costume dress-up. This season's workshops took place at Victory School, Margaret Park School, Constable Edward Finney School, and O. V. Jewitt Community School.

Student Programming

STUDENT NIGHT AT THE OPERA

Student Night at the Opera provides students with the opportunity to attend the final dress rehearsal for each of our productions for \$13 - a fraction of the regular ticket price. This season, through this program, over 950 students in grades 6 and up attended the fully staged dress rehearsals for Don Giovanni and The Barber of Seville.

Student Night at the Opera is open to students from public and private schools, home school groups, youth organizations, and postsecondary institutions. Although students are primarily from Winnipeg, many do travel from all over the province, and this season there were schools attending from La Broquerie, Headingley, Steinbach, and Gladstone. In addition, nearly 100 students from three schools in White City, Saskatchewan, travelled by bus to attend Closing Night of The Barber of Seville.

Comprehensive study guides are available on the Manitoba Opera website for use by teachers and students to enhance their knowledge about opera in general and provide information about, and context for, each production. These study guides also help students create links between the opera and literary, artistic, and social topics, both modern and historical.

production members to visit guests during dinner. Following dessert, guests listened to the chorus warm up and then took to their seats.







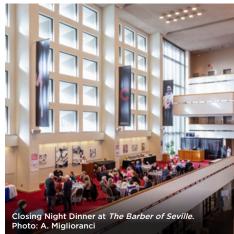














DINNER AT DE LUCA'S

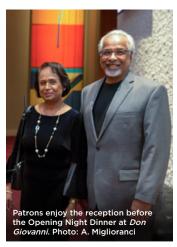








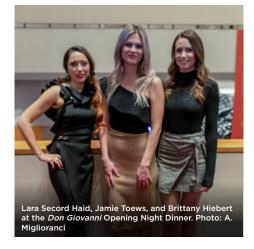














GALA RECEPTION IN HONOUR OF GAIL ASPER

COMPANY HONOURS WINNIPEG PHILANTHROPIST GAIL ASPER WITH CREATION OF THE GAIL ASPER AWARD

Manitoba Opera's Gala Reception honouring Winnipeg philanthropist Gail Asper was the company's most successful fundraising event in its 46-year history. The event raised more than \$255,000 for Manitoba Opera's productions and education programs and was held at the Manitoba Club on Thursday, September 13.

The Gala Reception paid tribute to Ms. Asper's exemplary leadership as a philanthropist and visionary whose conviction inspires others to serve, to give, and to make our community a better place.

"Manitoba Opera owes a great debt of gratitude to Gail Asper for all she has given us - her time and expertise, financial support,



her voice as a chorus member, and her unshakeable belief in the potential of our city," said Elba Haid, Chair of Manitoba Opera's Board of Trustees, who presented the award to Ms. Asper.

Designed by Winnipeg sculptor George W. Shannon, the award depicts two hands reaching upward, one supporting the other. The upper hand represents the quest for excellence; the supporting hand symbolizes the community effort required for excellence to thrive. The 250 guests were treated to performances by internationally renowned Winnipeg coloratura soprano Tracy Dahl, accompanied by pianist Tadeusz Biernacki; the Manitoba Opera Chorus; the Ron Paley Trio; as well as a video tribute to the honouree.

Future awards will be presented by Manitoba Opera to individuals who, like its namesake, demonstrate exemplary leadership in a field of endeavor or in pursuit of a visionary goal.

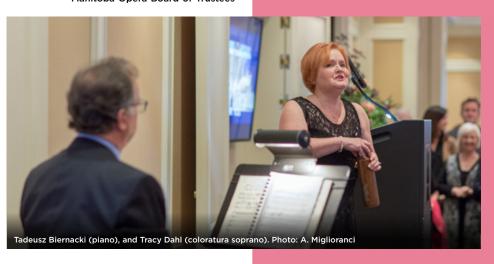

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ORGANIZATIONAL ADVANCEMENT

Manitoba Opera's Board of Trustees and staff work together to fulfill the company mission of changing people's lives through the glory of opera. We search for new ways of connecting with and serving our community as seen through the ongoing development of our practices, procedures, and programming.

Recruiting and investing in our people, advancing our technology, and employing strong governance practices are top priorities for the company. By evolving the organization along these lines, we deepen our impact on the community.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

At the 2018/19 Annual General Meeting on July 9, 2019, members of the organization elected Charlene Ilas and Paul Bruch-Wiens as new trustees. Appointed to the Board during the 2018/19 season, Grant Suderman was elected to his first term as a trustee. The Board



and staff welcome the new trustees and look forward to working with them in the coming year.

Current trustees re-elected were Leona Herzog, Daniela Ignat, Maria Mitousis, Dr. Bill Pope, Dustin Schneider, and Lori Yorke. Returning trustees in mid-terms are Judith Chambers, Dr. David Folk, Peter George, Elba Haid, Luisa Matheson, Alex Robinson, Keith Sinclair, and Dr. Jeffrey Sisler.

After completing four full terms, Sue Jurkovic-Bracken retired from the Board of Trustees at the end of the 2018/19 season. Sue was a member of the Bravo Gala Committee from 2010 to 2014, and co-chaired the committee during the 2014/15 season. Elected to the Board of Trustees in 2012,







Sue also served on the Special Events Committee. Manitoba Opera is thankful for Sue's passion, support, and generous volunteer work for the organization during her time on the Board.

In September 2018, new trustees attended a board orientation. This one-day, staff-led session equips Board members with organizational information to prepare them in their roles. New trustees increase their understanding of company operations and gain insight into the values and priorities that guide Manitoba Opera. In February, Elba Haid, Chair, attended the Opera America Trustees Forum in New York. This annual gathering brings

together trustees from across
North America to develop relationships with their colleagues
and share their experiences
of serving on an opera board.
Through shared learning, they
gain insights into the common
challenges, opportunities, and
trends affecting the opera sector.

The 2018 conference focused on meeting the expectations of today's arts audiences, recognizing and undoing ingrained racism in organizations, and institutionalizing the practices of equity, diversity, and inclusion.

STAFF CHANGES

In August 2018 Livia Dymond left the company to pursue other career opportunities. Livia began her career with Manitoba Opera as Marketing & Development Coordinator in 2009 and in 2011 was promoted to the position of Education & Outreach Coordinator.

During her time, the Education Department developed new opera programs for young people including Manitoba Opera's participation in the Seven Oaks School Division's Balanced Experiential Education Program, I Love to Read Month, and the launch of Opera Class, a free in-class opera workshop for K to Grade 6.



In September, Dr. Scott Miller joined the team as Education & Outreach Coordinator. Scott brings to this position a wealth of experience cultivated through his lifelong passion for innovation in music and education. Scott holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from Louisiana State University where he studied bassoon and musicology. He previously worked as Director of Education and Community Initiatives for the

Baton Rouge Symphony Orchestra.



GOVERNANCE & HUMAN RESOURCES

The 2018/19 season marked Dr. Bill Pope's first year as Chair of the Governance Committee. In February 2019, the Governance Committee launched Manitoba Opera's Accessible Customer Service Policy. This Board-approved policy aligns with Manitoba Opera's values to provide our programs and services to all Manitobans, and is in compliance with the recently adopted legislation The Accessibility for Manitobans Act.









The Governance Committee recently completed a review of the organizational bylaws, last amended in 2008. Small amendments were made to ensure ongoing good governance, and adjustments were reviewed by corporate counsel. The amended bylaws were approved by the Board of Trustees in June 2019 and ratified by the membership of Manitoba Opera at the 2018/19 AGM.

With the assistance of Payworks, Manitoba Opera has implemented a dedicated Human Resource Management tool for the first time in its history. The software system allows for the management of staff pay, benefit allocation, absence, overtime, and time-off management.

STRATEGIC PLANNING

Looking ahead to Manitoba Opera's 50th anniversary (2022/23 Season), the Manitoba Opera Board and staff have developed a strategic plan to guide the organization through to the anniversary season, and to use this special occasion as a launching point to advance the organization.

Building on the work conducted in the 2017/18 season, Board and staff have developed the findings into five key priorities for the company:

- Artistic Vitality
- Education
- Inclusion, Diversity, Equity and Access
- Community Engagement
- Relationships with Manitoba's Indigenous Communities

The organizational plan includes launching a \$10M Endowment Fund campaign and the production of new works outside the mainstage performance series. Organizational advancement ensures Manitoba Opera continues to be a leader in the field locally, nationally, and internationally. Efforts to move the company forward will help to solidify our future, reach new audiences, expand our programming, and increase our impact on the community.





ADVANCEMENTS IN TECHNOLOGY

DIGITAL TICKET SCANNERS

Manitoba Opera was pleased to launch its first digital ticket scanners this season. Real-time attendance tracking allows for better management of the venue on performance nights and provides added convenience for patrons through immediate ticket exchanges.

TRANSLATIONS PROJECTOR

In April 2019, Manitoba Opera was awarded a grant from the Manitoba Arts Council to be used towards the purchase of a new translations projector. This new projector will allow Manitoba Opera to continue to make our main stage productions accessible and understandable and help to

advance our efforts in enhancing the patron experience. It will make its debut at the first performance of the 2019/20 season.

Investments in technology align with Manitoba Opera's priority to continually enhance the patron experience.

BUILDING BRIDGES WITH INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES

This season, Manitoba Opera was one of two Canadian opera companies selected to receive a two-year Opera America Innovation Grant to begin in the 2019/20 season.

Supported by the Ann & Gordon Getty Foundation, this program allows companies to apply new and creative strategies to the opera field.

The funding will assist with the organization's work exploring the development of strong and deep connections with Manitoba's Indigenous communities.

DEBT REDUCTION CAMPAIGN

The 2018/19 season will be remembered as a transformative year for Manitoba Opera. It was a year in which many generous people came together to support an organization valued by the community.

In the summer of 2018, a donor pledged a \$100,000 matching gift and issued a challenge: eliminate Manitoba Opera's decades' old debt of \$450,652 by May 31, 2019. A campaign was launched to raise the remaining \$350,000 required to achieve this. As the campaign unfolded, the donor added another \$50,000 matching gift to help bring the campaign home. More than 190 individuals, corporations, foundations, and governments rose to the challenge with gifts from \$5 to \$150,000. Without their support, we would not be celebrating this historic achievement. We thank each donor for their remarkable generosity.

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FINANCE

FINANCE

Manitoba Opera posted an operating surplus of \$86,312 on a budget of \$2,672,277. An additional \$374,755 was raised toward the elimination of the debt of \$450.652, accumulated since the 1980's. \$10,415 was transferred to the Operating Reserve fund.

GRANTS

Base funding from the Canada Council, Manitoba Arts Council, Province of Manitoba, and Winnipeg Arts Council remained the same at \$240,000, \$220,000, \$150,000, and \$135,000, respectively. A supplemental grant of \$25,000 was received from the Province of Manitoba.

BOX OFFICE

Subscriptions decreased slightly to 2,711 from 2,768 in 2017/18. Single tickets decreased to 2,987 from 3,101 in 2017/18. Total box office cash revenues decreased to \$555,283 from \$600,209 in 2017/18. Subscription prices for the season averaged \$58.20 versus \$58.54 per ticket in 2017/18, and single tickets averaged \$68.82 versus \$78.27 per seat in 2017/18.

FUNDRAISING

Total fundraising for the 2018/19 season came to \$862,395. Camerata donations decreased to \$135,362 from \$151,919 in 2017/18. Major gifts were \$55,777 versus \$57,978 in 2017/18. Friend's gifts including Pass the Hat and other miscellaneous donations decreased to \$87,466 from \$101,700 in 2017/18 due to special one-time gifts received in the prior year. Cash sponsorships decreased to \$154,500 from \$167,000 in 2017/18 due to special sponsorships dedicated to La Traviata in 2017/18. Corporate donations decreased to \$16,750 from \$22,500 in 2017/18. Gifts from foundations were \$75,000 compared to \$131,000 in 2017/18, due to special gifts for La Traviata in 2017/18. Net proceeds from Special Events were \$205,188 compared to \$25,589 in 2017/18, due to The Gail Asper Gala Reception which raised a net of \$173,978 and two opera trips to Santa Fe and New York that netted \$19,566.

IN-KIND SPONSORSHIPS & COMPLIMENTARY TICKETS

In the normal course of operations, Manitoba Opera exchanges tickets for its productions in consideration for various goods and services. These transactions are accounted for in the statement of operations

at the fair value of the tickets exchanged which amounted to \$83,735 versus \$63,422 in 2017/18. Similarly, Manitoba Opera receives in-kind contributions related to donated advertising, marketing and musician services. These services were recorded at their fair value in the statement of operations at \$217,372 versus \$217,054 in 2017/18.

EXPENSES

Overall, savings of approximately 5% of budget were achieved across all departments. One staff position was left vacant throughout the year, contributing to the bulk of the savings.

ENDOWMENT

To help solidify the long-term future of Manitoba Opera, the Board of Trustees established an endowment fund through The Winnipeg Foundation. Launched in 2009/10, gifts made to the Manitoba Opera Endowment Fund will grow over time and provide a significant stream of revenue to help Manitoba Opera continue to serve the community with meaningful and inspiring programming.

In 2018/19, the fund grew by \$2,571 in contributions. As of May 31st, the Manitoba Opera Fund has a balance of \$301,924.

VOLUNTEERS

Manitoba Opera is grateful for the service of our dedicated volunteers. This season, more than 1,000 hours of service were provided by volunteers, including members of the Board of Trustees and committee members.

Volunteers are invaluable to the organization, assisting staff in preparing mailings, stuffing inserts into the program book, and providing a wide range of services on performance nights including staffing the subscription tables, collecting the Pass the Hat donations, and assisting in the Box Office.

The biennial Volunteer Recognition Reception was held on Monday, June 3. Nineteen volunteers were recognized for milestones of five and 10 years of service.

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OPERA STORIES FROM OUR PATRONS

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THE IMPACT OF **WERTHER**

"In 2017 we had our first opera experience with Werther. It was like nothing we had experienced before.
