# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Manitoba Opera's 47th season will undoubtedly be remembered for the fallout from the COVID-19 pandemic and the first-ever cancellation of a mainstage production, but this season should also be remembered for a number of major accomplishments also important to the company.

Our fall production of *Susannah* was a critical and artistic success, receiving 4.5 stars from the *Winnipeg Free Press*. Manitoba Opera has always prioritized supporting local artists and *Susannah* put this strategy in the spotlight. Of the cast of 12, 10 of the leading performers were home-grown Manitobans.

In a career milestone, Winnipeg soprano Lara Ciekiewicz won universal praise for her "tourde-force performance" (Winnipeg Free Press). Ms. Ciekiewicz demonstrated her considerable vocal and dramatic prowess in her portrayal of the title character. In the words of one reviewer, "...you won't hear it sung better anywhere." (Schmopera.com)

We also held a number of community engagement events in conjunction with *Susannah*, including square dance lessons, opportunities to learn about the music, and a panel discussion and conversation about sexual abuse in faith-based communities. Participants discussed the importance of creating safe spaces for victims of abuse and how communities can support individual healing.



The Education Department had an active year of programming including Al Simmons' one-man comic rendition of *The Barber of Seville*, which delighted thousands of students at 18 schools in and around Winnipeg.

Our spring production of *Carmen* was on track to sell out at the box office. However, in March, during the first week of rehearsals, we made the necessary decision to cancel the production due to the rapidly evolving nature of the pandemic. Within a matter of days, stakeholders were notified, artists were paid and sent home, production elements were returned to their vendors, and ticket returns and tax receipts were

being processed.

The board and staff acted quickly and decisively, and as a result, were able to mitigate the damage from the cancellation. By prioritizing the processing of ticket returns/tax receipts in the weeks following the cancellation, we were able to quickly process thousands of orders. This strategy freed up staff time in May to manage a successful year-end

matching donation campaign. Other remaining events were cancelled or re-envisioned, such as Dinner at De Luca's which was held online as De Luca's at Home in June. The Gail Asper Award Gala Reception honouring Mrs. Tannis Richardson was postponed to the spring of 2021.

In 2019, Manitoba Opera also embarked on a multi-year project to forge meaningful, respectful, and informed connections with Indigenous communities in Winnipeg and Manitoba. With the assistance of an Innovation Grant from Opera America, this project explores the role our organization may play in Canada's journey toward reconciliation and seeks to understand the company's place in the telling of Indigenous stories on our stage.

These past few months have been a time of resiliency and teamwork. We are grateful for a community who rallied around its opera company in its time of need, and are thankful for the generosity of our patrons, donors, corporate partners, and emergency government programs. Combined, they helped us to end the fiscal year in a position of financial stability.

Though this season will surely be characterized by the impact of the pandemic, this season should also be remembered for important artistic achievements, meaningful community engagement, and reflections on our role in reconciliation.

As we look forward to the months ahead and embrace the changes that are to come, we hope you will come with us on the journey of discovering new ways to experience opera.





# ARTISTIC PROGRAMMING

MANITOBA OPERA'S 47<sup>TH</sup> SEASON WAS SHAPING UP TO BE A BANNER YEAR - and then the world changed.

The season began promisingly in November with a production of American composer Carlisle Floyd's Susannah. Based on the apocryphal tale, Susanna and the Elders, and inspired by the folk melodies of Appalachia, Susannah tells the story of a beautiful Tennessee girl who innocently incites the lust of her church elders, leading to her denouncement as a sinner.

The cast was strongly led by Winnipeg-based soprano Lara Ciekiewicz in the title role. South Carolina's Kristopher Irmiter (Rev. Olin Blitch) and Louisiana's Michael Robert Hendrick (Sam Polk) made welcome returns to our stage. Winnipeg's James McLennan also returned, this time in the role of Little Bat McLean. The four church elders were sung by David Watson (Elder McLean), Peter John (P.J.) Buchan (Elder Gleaton), Terence Mierau (Elder Hayes), and Tom Goerz (Elder Ott). Singing the roles of the

elders' wives were Donnalynn Grills (Mrs. McLean), Dawn Bruch-Wiens (Mrs. Gleaton), Naomi Forman (Mrs. Hayes), and Shannon Unger (Mrs. Ott).

Canadian-born and New Yorkbased stage director, Kelly Robinson, received a warm reception after an absence of many years. Assisting Mr. Robinson was Winnipeg choreographer Brenda Gorlick. Tyrone Paterson, Manitoba Opera's Music Advisor and Principal Conductor, led the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, and Tadeusz Biernacki, Manitoba Opera's Assistant Music Director and Chorus Master, prepared the 20-voice Manitoba Opera Chorus. Winnipeg's Bill Williams provided the lighting design.

The rented production, designed by Erhard Rom, came from Virginia Opera with costumes from Opéra de Montréal.

In April, Manitoba Opera was to be back on the Centennial Concert Hall stage with a production of arguably the world's most popular opera, Georges Bizet's *Carmen*.

We were eagerly anticipating the company debut of Quebec-born and Berlin-based mezzosoprano Nora Sourouzian in the title role. Newfoundland tenor David Pomeroy was cast as Don José. We were looking forward to two other company debuts: American bass-baritone, Timothy Renner, as the bullfighter Escamillo, and

Winnipeg-based soprano Lida Szkwarek as Micaëla. Canadian bass Giles Tomkins was to sing the role of Zuniga. Winnipeggers Lara Secord-Haid and Laurelle Czaplinski were cast in the roles of Frasquita and Mercédès, respectively. Canadians Johnathon Kirby (Moralès/Le Dancaïre) and Jean-Philippe Lazure (Le Remendado) completed the cast.

Edmonton's Brian Deedrick was to direct the production, with Winnipeg's Brenda Gorlick again on board to assist with choreography.

Tyrone Paterson was back in his role as conductor. Tadeusz Biernacki prepared the 44-voice Manitoba Opera Chorus, and the 16-voice Children's Chorus was prepared by Carolyn Boyes.

Winnipeg's Robert Borges was hired to provide the fight direction, and Scott Henderson was doing the lighting design. The rental production, designed by Camellia Koo, was to have come from Edmonton Opera, with costumes again provided by Opéra de Montréal.

The visiting artists arrived in Winnipeg on the weekend of March 7/8, and we began staging rehearsals with the cast and artistic team on Monday, March 9. Within days of beginning rehearsals, public events across North America were being cancelled or postponed due to the emerging global pandemic. As the week progressed, it became clear that in consideration of the health and safety of all those involved, we would not be able to proceed with the production as planned.

Rehearsals were halted on Saturday, March 14, and the next day was spent making travel arrangements for the visiting artists. All arrived home safely by Tuesday, March 17. By end of day Wednesday, March 18, all the various production elements - props, wardrobe, etc. - had been packed for shipping and were ready to be returned to their respective points of origin. Thursday, March 19, was the last day in the office for staff and as of Friday, they were working from home-based offices.

Manitoba Opera is proud of the relationships it has developed over the years with many of North America's finest artists. The company offers exciting opportunities for both established and emerging artists to continue the development of their craft, and Manitoba Opera's Production Department strives to create an environment where these artists are able to do their best work.

Manitoba Opera will be honoured when we are once again able to welcome these artists to the company, and we look forward to the day when we can bring these great stories, told through beautiful music, to life once more.

# **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**

Once again this season,
Manitoba Opera presented a
wide variety of community
engagement activities related
to our productions including an
evening of learning to square
dance; a presentation on tarot
cards; a thought-provoking
discussion on *Carmen* in the
Era of #MeToo; and a panel
discussion about sexual abuse
in faith-based communities.

Through our community engagement activities, the company reaches out to new groups and individuals, provides context to the operas performed, and provides forums for discussions about issues that have relevance to 21st century society.

This year over 2,500 people participated in community engagement events.



# OPERA ACCESS PROGRAM

Manitoba Opera annually donates tickets to social services agencies for client use. In 2019/20, 150 tickets to *Susannah* were distributed to 13 organizations, providing an opportunity for individuals who may not otherwise be able to attend a performance.

Organizations receiving tickets included Thrive Community
Support Circle, the Elizabeth Fry
Society, the Canadian Mental
Health Association, Macdonald
Youth Services, Manitoba
Interfaith Immigration Council,
Girl Guides of Canada, Ka Ni
Kanicihk, Sexuality Education
Resource Centre MB, and
Opportunities for Employment.

In addition, 114 ticket vouchers were donated in response to fundraising requests from community organizations.

# **OPERA PRIMER**

Opera Primer is a one-hour lecture presented by music expert Don Anderson that helps prepare audiences to get the most out of their night at the opera. The opera is given context, complete with historical background on its creation and premiere, and anecdotes about the composer's life, interspersed with DVD clips of key moments in the opera.

The Opera Primer for Susannah was held Sunday, November 17, at the Canadian Museum for Human Rights (CMHR). The Carmen Opera Primer scheduled for Sunday, March 22, and also to be held at the CMHR, was cancelled due to the pandemic.





# UNDERSTANDING THE **MUSIC**

Understanding the Music is a one-hour presentation that unpacks some of the mystery and nuance in the music of the season's productions by examining the composer's approach and providing historical and social context.

Dr. Colette Simonot-Maiello. Assistant Professor of Musicology, University of Manitoba, Desautels Faculty of Music, presented the lecture for *Susannah* on Saturday, November 9, at the Millennium Library's Carol Shields Auditorium.

Dr. James Maiello. Associate Professor of Musicology, University of Manitoba, Desautels Faculty of Music, presented the lecture for Carmen on Saturday, March 7, at the Canadian Museum for Human Rights.

# **PRE-SHOW CHAT**

For every production, a 20-minute lecture on the opera is held a half-hour before curtain at each performance. This year's guest speaker for the *Susannah* pre-show chat was soprano Ashley Rees who is also a host for Classic Radio 107. Carmen's pre-show chat. which was cancelled, was to have been presented by music lover and former CBC Radio host, Andrea Ratuski.





# SIT IN ON THE SITZ

Each year, donors of \$100 or more are invited to attend the Sitzprobe rehearsals to enjoy a sneak peek of the opera and a conversation about the production with the stage director, hosted by Larry Desrochers, General Director & CEO. The Susannah Sit in on the Sitz was held on Tuesday, November 19, with the production's director, Kelly Robinson. Carmen's Sit in on the Sitz was cancelled.

# **DISCOVER OPERA**

As part of the Discover Opera program, soprano Andrea Lett and pianist Lisa Rumpel presented free recitals for Trailblazers Life Choices locations in Winnipeg in November. The audience responded enthusiastically to their performances, and particularly enjoyed the opportunity to sing along and to talk about the music that they love. Complimentary tickets to attend Susannah were provided to interested participants.

# **FOLK SONG TRADITIONS**

Much of the music of Carlisle Floyd's *Susannah* is rooted in folk music of Appalachia. In this presentation, musicologist Dr. Colette Simonot-Maiello explained how Floyd created a soundscape of Tennessee in the opera by drawing

On Wednesday, November 13, Manitoba Opera hosted a conversation about sexual abuse within faith communities, a theme that is part of the central conflict of the opera. Panelists for this discussion included Kelly Bernardin-Dvorak, Family Therapist, Jonah Counseling

& Consulting; Jaymie Friesen,
Abuse Response and Prevention
Coordinator, Mennonite Central
Committee MB; Stan McKay,
Cree Elder from Fisher River
Cree Nation; and John Neufeld,
Lead Pastor, The Meeting Place.
The panel was moderated by
Carolyn Klassen, Therapist,
Conexus Counseling.

# **COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT**

Manitoba Square & Round Dance Federation

Along with his music, Carlisle Floyd uses square dancing as the backdrop for a pivotal scene in *Susannah* to transport his audience to rural Appalachia. Square dancing is a fun and social all-ages activity that is a long-standing favourite pastime of rural communities, with a rich history in Manitoba.

In partnership with members of the Manitoba Square & Round Dance Federation, led by caller Brian Lewis, Manitoba Opera presented an evening of square dance lessons on Thursday, October 10, at the Norwood Legion.

Club members also presented a square dancing demonstration on the Piano Nobile during the intermission of each performance.

# **COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT**

Klinic Community Health

Recognizing that sometimes the subject matter in an opera can be intense or triggering for a viewer, Manitoba Opera invited Klinic Community Health to provide information in the program about presenting and experiencing art in a trauma-informed way.

Representatives from Klinic were also available in the lobby, and their presence served to remind us that while our response to trauma is deeply individual, it does not need to be solitary.

# CARMEN

Even though our production of *Carmen* had to be cancelled due to the pandemic, the weeks leading up to Opening Night were filled with events that provided a fresh look at the world's most popular opera.

Nearly 400 people attended community engagement events around *Carmen*.



# FILM SCREENING

Carmen Jones

The story of *Carmen* has been creatively adapted repeatedly since its inception. Manitoba Opera presented a screening of the 1954 Golden Globe Award-winning movie *Carmen Jones*. The film sets the story in mid 20<sup>th</sup>-century America. It was groundbreaking in that it featured an all-Black cast starring Dorothy Dandridge and Harry Belafonte. The film was screened on Saturday, February 29, at Cinematheque.

# A TASTE OF TAROT

The stereotypical image of the fortune-teller, the Roma woman reading tarot cards, actually grew out of the popularity of the opera in the 19th century, owing to the scene where *Carmen* foretells her own death in the cards.

To demystify and explore preconceived notions of what the tarot is and how it is used, patrons were invited to spend an evening with Francesca Cesari of Sacred Glow, who led an exploration into the mysteries of the tarot. Participants also enjoyed French-inspired savoury and dessert items, accompanied by French wine. A Taste of Tarot was held Thursday, March 5, at Frenchway Café.

# **CARMEN** Lectures & Discussion in French

Composed by Georges Bizet, Carmen is the best-known French opera and this provided an opportunity for the company to partner with the Université de Saint-Boniface (USB) to present an event for the Francophone community.

From the Frigid North: When Nietzsche Met Carmen was presented by Professor Antoine Cantin-Brault, PhD. USB president Sophie Bouffard, PhD, presented Carmen:

Beyond Seduction. A lively discussion followed the







lectures, which were presented in French at the university on Wednesday, March 11.

# CARMEN IN THE ERA OF #METOO

A recurring topic in the performing arts is the question of whether the works of the historical canon, many of which display outdated attitudes towards sexism and race, are still relevant for modern audiences.

The speaker was Arthur Schafer, Professor of Philosophy at the University of Manitoba and Founding Director of the University's Centre for Professional and Applied Ethics. He engaged patrons in a conversation about performing "classic" operas and plays such as *Carmen* and



The Merchant of Venice in a 21st century world which has very different attitudes towards sexism and racism. The conversation took place on Saturday, March 14, in the Carol Shields Auditorium, Millennium Library.

# **COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT**

In recognition of the strong female characters in each of this season's productions and to support the empowerment of women, Manitoba Opera was a sponsor of the Powered Professionals Women's Summit held Thursday, March 12, at the Victoria Inn.

Soprano Andrea Lett, who made her MO debut last season as Zerlina in *Don Giovanni* and appeared on our stage again as the maid Berta in *The Barber* 

of Seville, was the featured speaker at the event's lunch session. She shared her story on becoming a professional singer and led the participants in some typical warm-up exercises before treating them to a sample of her vocal talent.

# STUDENT NIGHT AT THE OPERA

SNO is open to students from public and private schools, home school groups, youth organizations, and post-secondary institutions. Although students are primarily from Winnipeg, many do travel from all over the province, and this season there were schools attending from Niverville, Headingly, and Steinbach.

Comprehensive study guides are available on Manitoba Opera's website for teachers and students. These resources provide information about opera, as well as context for each production. Study guides help students create links between the opera and literary,

artistic, and social topics, both modern and historical.

# **OPERA IN A TRUNK**

In its 10th season, Opera in a Trunk is a program for grades K-6. The trunk is free of charge for schools and is designed to be used to connect opera to a number of the core subjects.

# I LOVE TO READ MONTH

February is "I Love to Read Month" in Manitoba schools; Manitoba Opera participated by bringing an opera singer into elementary school classrooms to engage students' imaginations through a reading of *Opera Cat*, vocal activities, and a short performance. Students even learned a little bit of Italian! This year, two presenters, soprano Katherine Mayba and bass-baritone Stephen Haiko-Pena, visited six schools in Winnipeg and read to over 400 students.





# B.E.E.P.

For the seventh consecutive year, Manitoba Opera participated in the Seven Oaks School Division's Balanced Experiential Education Program (B.E.E.P). Soprano Andrea Lett facilitated 10 workshops, introducing opera to 600 students. Students in grades 1-8 participated in singing exercises, music activities, and costume dress-up.

This season's workshops took place at Elwick School, Margaret Park School, Constable Edward Finney School, Governor Semple School, and O. V. Jewitt Community School throughout the summer.

# AL SIMMONS WINTER SCHOOL TOUR

Without a doubt, the highlight of our education programming this season was the Al Simmons' one-man rendition of *The Barber of Seville*, which toured to schools in Winnipeg and the surrounding region. From January through March 2020, 20 shows were presented at 18 schools to over 6,300 students.

This is a great entry point into opera for elementary-aged students, many of whom have already heard the famous tunes in cartoons and movies. When Al calls for them to sing "Figaro!" his audience participates with sheer unbridled enthusiasm.

Al plays 10 different characters in the opera – wearing a different hat, wig, or costume for each – and even delivers some scenes in the original Italian. What's that? The students don't all speak Italian? Well, then Al just repeats the scene in English!

Jokes, puns, antics, and zany props (like carrot scissors) aside, the show is packed with opera knowledge that Al shares with the students. They learn about

Rossini, who wrote nearly 40 operas before retiring at the age of 38, and most importantly, they learn that opera is just a fun way to tell stories.

In 2018, a fire damaged Al's storage shed, destroying many of the one-of-a-kind gadgets, and custom costumes that he uses in his shows. With Manitoba Opera's support, Al was able to rebuild his show, replacing all manner of wigs, hats, props, and garments that he dons (or shares with mannequins) to bring the characters in the opera to life.

Elba Haid, Chair of the Board of Trustees, was named the 2020 recipient of the Opera.ca National Opera Directors Recognition Award (NODRA).

NODRA is awarded by Opera.ca, the national association for opera companies and professionals in Canada. The award highlights the tenets of good governance, celebrates models of volunteer excellence, and raises the bar for board director commitment.

"The strength and stability of an opera company correlates to the calibre of its volunteer leadership, and strong governance is a crucial factor in an opera company's success. Elba Haid's contributions to Manitoba Opera are exemplary, enabling the company to increase its fundraising, eliminate debt, and build a strong foundation for the future," stated Christina Loewen, Executive Director of Opera.ca. "We are delighted to honour Elba Haid with this award and to celebrate the impact she has made and continues to make."

Elba joined the board in 2007. Prior to becoming chair, she served as Chair of the Annual Gala and of the Camerata Committee (for donors starting at \$1,250) during which time gifts and donations increased by 20%. In 2018, she was instrumental in the development of a new fundraising initiative - The Gail Asper Award - named after Winnipeg philanthropist Gail Asper and awarded to individuals who, like its namesake, demonstrate exemplary leadership or pursuit of a visionary goal. The event raised \$255,000 in its first year.

Elba Haid has been instrumental in board recruitment and diversification. She has been able to draw in members from a variety of diverse communities in fields including finance, business, health care, and law.

Her leadership has not gone unnoticed in the community. In 2018/19, on the strength of her leadership, a private donor stepped forward with a challenge gift of \$100,000 to eliminate a long-standing debt the company had carried for 30 years.

Elba Haid's personal support of Manitoba Opera is exemplary. She hosts donor events in her home, has pledged \$100,000 to the Endowment Fund, and has included Manitoba Opera in her estate planning.

In describing Elba's impact on Manitoba Opera, nominator Larry Desrochers, General Director & CEO, said, "Elba is an inspiring leader. She wins people over with her warmth and charm and because she is genuinely interested in them. She is poised and gracious. She's a mentor, a teacher, a strategist, a planner, and an optimist. She sets the bar high and encourages us all to reach for it. She is so deserving of this recognition by Opera.ca."

Appointed to the Board during the 2019/20 season, Lana Maidment was elected to her first term as a trustee. The Board and staff welcome the new trustees and look forward to working with them in the coming year.

Abbie was an instrumental trustee; she served on the Community Engagement Committee, the Workplace Safety & Health Committee, and many special event committees over the years including the Bravo Gala. # **STAFF** Professional Development

In June 2019, Larry Desrochers, General Director & CEO; Michael Blais, Director of Administration; and Darlene Ronald, Director of Marketing, travelled to San Francisco to attend the Opera America Conference. This annual gathering of more than 700 opera professionals allows staff to connect with colleagues and counterparts at other companies and delve into important topics and learning opportunities for the opera sector.

Drawing on the innovative spirit of the San Francisco Bay area, the 2019 conference focused on examining the traditional landscape of opera and its repertoire, and exploring ways that new performance practices, business innovations. and enhanced civic-centered practices can evolve the art form in the 21st century.

In October 2019, Larry Desrochers, Darlene Ronald, and Scott Miller. Education & Outreach Coordinator attended Creative Convergence Winnipeg. Hosted by The Canadian Network for Arts & Learning, the conference focused on the work that arts organizations are doing to create lasting connections in their communities through outreach, education, and collaboration.



Since January 2020, Jayne Hammond, Grants & Corporate Giving Manager, has been participating in a mentorship program through the Association of Fundraising Professionals. Jayne is mentored by Kristine Betker, Director of Fund Development for the Royal Winnipeg Ballet. Jayne has also participated in learning sessions through the Winnipeg Foundation throughout the year.

# **STAFF** Boards

Larry Desrochers completed the third year of his second term as a member of the Board of Directors for Opera America. serving on the Membership, Artistic, Governance, and Civic Action Committees. He continues to be actively involved in Opera.ca as well.

Conference participation, professional development, and participation in special programs at Opera America and Opera.ca demonstrates Manitoba Opera's commitment to investing in the talent, leadership, and skills of its Board and staff.







# STAFF CHANGES

In June 2019, Sandra Schmidtke, **Grants & Corporate Giving** Manager left Manitoba Opera to pursue other career opportunities. During her time at Manitoba Opera, Sandra developed strong connections with corporate partners, foundations, and sponsors. She was instrumental in the development and launch of new initiatives including Trivia Night, Fashion Fridays, and the Tweet Seat program.

In September 2019, Jayne Hammond joined the team as Grants & Corporate Giving Manager. Jayne is a trained singer with experience working in the non-profit sector. As a performer, Jayne previously performed with MO at the Camerata event, the Dinner at

De Luca's and in the chorus for Don Giovanni and Madama Butterfly. Jayne holds degrees from Wilfrid Laurier University and the University of Manitoba.

In January 2020, Tania Douglas joined the company as the Director of Development. Tania brings over 15 years of experience in the charitable sector, working with such organizations as the Children's Hospital Foundation, Inclusion Winnipeg, and Mentoring Artists for Women's Art (MAWA). Tania is a past-president of the Association for Fundraising Professionals, Manitoba (AFP) Chapter and a session instructor for AFP's Fundamentals of Fundraising course. She holds a Certified Fundraising Executive designation from CFRF International.

# **GOVERNANCE & HUMAN** RESOURCES

The 2019/20 season marked Dr. Bill Pope's second year as the Chair of the Governance Committee. Building on the committee's previously developed Accessible Customer Service Policy, the committee focused this season on the Employment Standard of *The* Accessibility for Manitobans Act. The committee developed Workplace Emergency Response Information, and Workplace Emergency Assistance documentation for staff. These two protocols were put into place in April 2020 to keep all employees safe during an emergency.

The committee continued its regular review of governing documents and policies. Areas of review included Board engagement measures, meeting frequency, and enhanced criteria for Board recruitment.

Organizational advancement ensures Manitoba Opera continues to be a leader in the field locally, nationally, and internationally. Efforts to move the company forward solidify our future, reach new audiences, expand our programming, and increase our impact on the community.






# **BUILDING BRIDGES** WITH INDIGENOUS **COMMUNITIES**

Manitoba Opera embarked on a multi-year project this season geared towards developing relationships with Indigenous communities in Manitoba. This program is supported in part by a two-year grant from Opera America's Innovation Program.

The project was designed with guidance from our community consultant Jessica Dumas. Jessica is a band member of the Anishinaabe community from Keeseekowenin First Nation in Manitoba and is president of Jessica Dumas Coaching and Training, Jessica has experience in conflict resolution, social justice advocacy, public speaking, and Indigenous history awareness. She is also the current chair of the Winnipeg Chamber of Commerce.

The first year focused on learning and listening and the project commenced with an Indigenous Awareness survey. Circulated to board members and staff, the purpose of the survey was to establish a benchmark for





gauging the board and staff's understanding of Indigenous culture, Indigenous history, and an understanding of the effects of the Indian Act and the residential school system. Further survey work will be conducted throughout the duration of the project to gauge changes amongst participants.

# Blanket Exercise

In December, we held our first training session. The session was started with an explanation of a smudging ceremony, followed by a smudge. Led by Jessica Dumas, the Blanket Exercise traced the history of North America from an Indigenous perspective.

Participants reported that this was a meaningful experience, and that they gained an understanding of the trauma experienced by Indigenous people in Canada. A particularly powerful moment was when Elder Betty Ross shared her story and experience in the residential school system. The session culminated with a sharing circle that left the experience on a high note for participants.

# Legacy Discussion

Held in mid-February 2020, this session included focused presentations and discussions on topics such as residential schools and the Indian Act. The session also explored resources about the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.

Participants engaged in a discussion to further understand the impact of these topics and how they have shaped the landscape today. The session concluded with a Q & A, followed by discussion.

At the culmination of this session, a small working group of staff and board members was established to further develop the next steps for the program. The next year of the project will focus on identifying and addressing knowledge gaps, exploring engagement and training opportunities, cultivating relationships with Indigenous organizations and leaders, and identifying which of the 94 Calls to Action should be addressed by MO. The Calls to Action were a result of The Truth & Reconciliation Commission's documentation of the effects of

the residential school system on Indigenous people. These calls, if acted upon, offer a chance at meaningful reconciliation.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Building Bridges project was put on hiatus in mid-March and was reconvened online in late May. The working group looks forward to continuing the project next season and will continue to educate the board and staff and develop policies and priorities to build strong and deep connections with Indigenous communities in Manitoba.







# **ADVANCEMENTS IN TECHNOLOGY**

To promote public health efforts to mitigate COVID-19, Manitoba businesses closed their doors in mid-March. MO staff worked with our technology partners at Clear Concepts, Arts Management Systems, and SAGE Simply Accounting to move our business activities fully online.

With the ability to connect with, and provide service to our patrons, maintain financial controls, and connect with our colleagues, we were able to carry on our core business functions as usual.



This technology will continue to benefit Manitoba Opera by increasing the accessibility of our services and programs. We anticipate a future with pop-up stores to buy tickets, increased venue options with real-time house management and registration, and full patron service at all our events.

# **FINANCE**

Manitoba Opera posted an operating surplus of \$1,370 on a budget of \$1,972,497.

# **GRANTS**

Operational funding from the Canada Council for the Arts, Manitoba Arts Council, and Province of Manitoba. remained the same at \$240,000, \$220,000, and \$150,000, respectively. Funding from the Winnipeg Arts Council (WAC) was reduced from \$135,000 to \$121,500 due to a cut in WAC's funding from the City of Winnipeg.



A supplemental grant of \$25,000 was received from the Province of Manitoba. Other grants included \$70,967 from the Canadian Emergency Wage Subsidy: \$11,930 from Cultural Spaces for a new surtitles projector; and \$5,000 from the Manitoba Arts Council, also for the projector. As well, \$6,169 of a \$35,000 Opera America Innovations Grant for the Building Bridges project was booked into the 2019/20 fiscal year.

# **BOX OFFICE**

The cancellation of Carmen resulted in a significant drop in single ticket sales and overall box office revenues.

Subscriptions decreased to 2,359 from 2,711 in 2018/19. Single tickets decreased to 736 from 2,987 in 2018/19. Total box office cash revenues decreased to \$182,030 from \$555,283 in 2018/19. Subscription prices for the season averaged \$58.24 versus \$58.20 per ticket in 2018/19, and single tickets averaged \$51.07 versus \$68.82 per seat in 2018/19.

# **FUNDRAISING**

Many special events were postponed or cancelled due to COVID-19. The Carmen Opening and Closing Night Dinners and a patron trip to New York City to see performances at The Metropolitan Opera were cancelled. Dinner at De Luca's was rescheduled as an online event in June of 2020. The Gail Asper Award honouring Mrs. Tannis Richardson has been rescheduled to the spring of 2021.




As a result of the generosity of patrons, approximately \$150,000 in revenue from *Carmen* tickets, affiliated special events, and parking was donated back to the company.


Total fundraising from all operating campaigns decreased to \$869,000 from \$1,236,000 in 2018/19. Camerata donations decreased to \$133,530 from \$135,362 in 2018/19. Major gifts increased to \$108,289 versus \$55,713 in 2018/19. Gifts from Friends, including Pass the Hat and other miscellaneous donations, increased to \$245,586 from \$87,466 in 2018/19 including the approximately \$150,000 referenced above. Cash sponsorships decreased to \$147,000 from \$154,500 in 2018/19. Corporate donations increased to \$17,300 from \$16,750 in 2018/19.

Gifts from foundations stayed the same as in 2018/19 at \$75,000. Net proceeds from Special Events were -\$870 compared to \$205,188 in 2018/19 due to the postponement or cancellation of the events mentioned above.

# IN-KIND SPONSORSHIPS & COMPLIMENTARY TICKETS

In the normal course of operations, Manitoba Opera exchanges tickets for its productions in consideration for various goods and services. These transactions are accounted for in the statement of operations at the fair value of the tickets exchanged which amounted to \$28,649 versus \$83,755 in 2018/19. Similarly, Manitoba Opera receives in-kind





# **EXPENSES**

Overall, savings were achieved in all departmental budgets.



# **ENDOWMENT**

To help solidify the long-term future of Manitoba Opera, the Board of Trustees established an endowment fund through The Winnipeg Foundation. Launched in 2009/10, gifts made to the Manitoba Opera Endowment Fund will grow over time and provide a significant stream of revenue to help Manitoba Opera continue to serve the community with meaningful and inspiring programming.

In 2019/20, the fund grew by \$150,262. As of May 31st, the Manitoba Opera Fund has a balance of \$450,303.



Manitoba Opera is grateful for the service of our dedicated volunteers. This season, volunteers, including members of the Board of Trustees and committee members, provided over 300 hours of service to Manitoba Opera (volunteer hours provided are less this season as a result of the cancellation of *Carmen*).

Volunteers are invaluable to the organization and assist with tasks including preparing mailings, stuffing inserts into the program book, and providing a wide range of services on performance nights.
