

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The 2021/22 season was one of re-invention, re-programming, and resilience. Early in the pandemic, Manitoba Opera (MO) identified the key attributes of our in-person artistic, education, and community engagement programming. These attributes formed the foundation for our video content creation, ensuring that the high-quality work that we normally present to live audiences would be replicated online. Professionalism, relevance, interaction, and social connection were just some of the attributes that staff considered as programming evolved over the course of the year.

In all, the company produced or presented 43 artistic, educational, engagement, or special projects. Activities were livestreamed, recorded, or presented on Zoom. Manitoba Opera provided work opportunities for more than 200 artists and craftspeople/professionals and connected with local and international audiences.

An outdoor concert at the ruins of St. Boniface Cathedral in late August was the only event of the year attended by a live audience - all 50 invited guests were masked and socially distanced.

With the cancellation of the season opening production of Sweenev Todd: The Demon Barber of Fleet Street, we opened our "mainstage" season with The Sopranos of Winnipeg in November. This livestreamed concert with the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra featured the talents of seven outstanding sopranos who call our city home: Tracy Dahl, Andriana Chuchman, Lara Ciekiewicz, Monica Huisman, Lida Szkwarek, Andrea Lett. and Lara Secord-Haid. Originally planned for a small in-person audience before a full lockdown was declared a week prior, the concert was viewed nearly 1,000 times by an estimated 2,100 individuals. The concert also featured opening remarks from the company's season sponsor BMO, presented by Regional Vice President -Personal, Kristen Kennedy.

As the season progressed, changing health regulations, both locally and in other provinces, forced us to replace planned projects with smaller, more manageable ones.

The cancellation of *Tosca* was communicated to patrons in January. A planned concert in February featuring some of



Canada's BIPOC artists was cancelled due to the continuing pandemic. We tried to replace that event with a video recital series featuring artists across Canada, but this was also cancelled after filming was prohibited during lockdowns in Toronto and Montreal. A livestream concert that would have featured singers from Western Canada was similarly cancelled after the Western travel bubble was dissolved.

We eventually produced a video project called The Solo Sessions, which launched the last week of May. Directed by awardwinning director Deco Dawson, this five-episode cinematic concert series showcased musical genres from opera to folk, musical theatre, pop music, and everything in between. Featured vocalists were tenor and Manitoba Opera favourite James McLennan; Lisa Bell, a singer, actress, and songwriter who recently starred in the movie musical Stand!; Aaron

Hutton, an award-winning and sought-after crossover vocalist; Lizzy Hoyt, a mezzo-soprano, fiddler, and award-winning Celtic singer-songwriter; and singer-actor Stephanie Sy.

In April, a video of members of the Manitoba Opera Chorus performing the Easter Hymn from *Cavalleria Rusticana* with solo soprano Lara Ciekiewicz reached more than 30,000 impressions on Facebook.

We also supported Little Opera Company's opera game show video series All Those Arias which was released throughout the month of May.

In August 2020, Manitoba Opera launched the Digital **Emerging Artists Program** (DEAP). This four-week professional development program was created to help young opera singers build careers online. Four outstanding singers were selected from applicants across Canada to participate in this fully paid online learning opportunity, and all four found career success in video opera projects post-graduation. The 2020 DEAP created 40 jobs for artists across the country at a time when stages around the country had gone dark.

Our education programming was also successfully reimagined. A family-friendly video production of *The Barber of Seville* as Styled by Al Simmons was presented for free in March and viewed over 3,300 times. Four episodes of Opera Storytime, a web series featuring local personalities reading children's books with an opera theme, have been viewed over 390 times. We also created a six-episode Opera School online series designed to inspire children to create their own operas by exploring Mozart's *The Magic Flute*.

Our three-episode Opera in the Garden web series, released in the fall of 2020, showcased local singers in private gardens and was hosted by *Winnipeg Free Press* gardening columnist Colleen Zacharias.

Throughout the season, online community engagement events like Virtual Paint Class, Bravo Book Club, and Pizza, Beer & Craft Night have brought Winnipeggers together to enjoy artistic activities, great food, and operatic treats. In February, more than 500 patrons tuned into a free movie stream of *Bel Canto* hosted by Manitoba Opera.

A new partnership with The Winnipeg Boldness Project, an Indigenous-led organization working to improve outcomes for children in the underserved Point Douglas neighbourhood, was also formed this past season. The Winnipeg Boldness Project connected Manitoba Opera to five families with a total of 16 children who were interested in viewing *The Barber of Seville* as Styled by

Al Simmons. We delivered viewing packages to each family that included themed colouring pages, crayons, snacks, and a study guide.

We took our popular Dinner at De Luca's event online with De Luca's at Home: part cooking show, part opera performance, part virtual dinning experience. Its continued popularity resulted in three versions of the dinner being held over the season.

Throughout the year, we continued to strengthen our governance, professional development, and organization building practices so that the company will remain strong through the remainder of the pandemic and beyond.

As we look back on the year, we're thankful for the generous support of public funders, donors, patrons, and sponsors. With that support Manitoba Opera was able to respond, in a time of crisis, with reinvention, reprogramming, and resiliency.

ARTISTIC PROGRAMMING

MANITOBA OPERA'S 2020/21 SEASON WAS A SEASON UNLIKE ANY THAT PRECEDED IT.

CONCERT IN THE CATHEDRAL LIVE RECITAL

As the pandemic spread, and event after event was either postponed or cancelled across the city and the province during the spring and summer of 2020, an opportunity presented itself for us to host a small outdoor concert at the end of August.

Following public health protocols in place at the time, we presented a 90-minute recital in the ruins of the St. Boniface Cathedral the evening of Sunday, August 23.



The Winnipeg-based artists featured were sopranos Andriana Chuchman and Lara Ciekiewicz, mezzo-soprano Laurelle Czaplinski, and tenor James McLennan. Tadeusz Biernacki was the collaborative pianist for all four singers.

The performance was attended by a masked and socially distanced audience of approximately 50 people.

THE SOPRANOS OF WINNIPEG LIVESTREAM CONCERT

In the fall of 2020 it became increasingly apparent that due to the pandemic, and with the safety of the performers, the production staff, and the audience in mind, our seasonopening production of Stephen Sondheim's *Sweeney Todd: The Demon Barber of Fleet Street* would not be able to proceed as planned. We were, however, still hopeful that some live performance opportunities would be possible in the fall. With that in mind, we decided to move forward with a mixed-repertoire concert which would feature the orchestra and a sampling of the wealth of opera talent residing here in Winnipeg. Seven (SEVEN!) sopranos who have graced stages across Canada, throughout North America, and around the world would be featured: (alphabetically) Andriana Chuchman, Lara Ciekiewicz, Tracy Dahl, Monica Huisman, Andrea Lett, Lara Secord-Haid, and Lida Szkwarek. Manitoba Opera Chorus Master and Assistant Music Director, Tadeusz Biernacki, would lead a reduced and physically distanced 40-member Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra in a concert of arias and orchestral selections.

In co-operation with the management of the Centennial Concert Hall, as well as our colleagues at the Royal Winnipeg Ballet (RWB) and the



Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra (WSO), a plan was put into place to allow for reduced-capacity audiences to attend events in the Hall. Our colleagues at the WSO successfully held two concerts on the weekend of October 3, and then the pandemic returned with a fresh wave of new infections. As the Province moved to Code Red in their pandemic response plan, we made the decision to proceed with the concert without an audience being present in the Hall. Instead, the plan was altered to stream the live concert over the internet. With assistance and technical expertise from the staff and crew from AVentPro. we were able to successfully stream the concert to the audience in their homes the evening of Saturday, November 7.

THE BARBER OF SEVILLE AS **STYLED BY AL SIMMONS** VIDEO

In late winter, thanks to special funding from the provincial government's Safe at Home Manitoba program, as well as support from Manitoba Hydro, Payworks, and Canada Life, the company was able to produce a video version of Al Simmons' hit show The Barber of Seville.


Commissioned by Manitoba Opera in 2009 as a 45-minute performance for student groups, this wonderfully witty show has toured several times throughout Manitoba. Al's version of Rossini's famous opera is full of his signature style and charming storytelling, with clever pop culture references and commentary.

The video was filmed over five days at the Royal Manitoba Theatre Centre's (RMTC) Tom Hendry Warehouse Theatre digital studio facility, in partnership with Moose Toque Productions. The video was released online on March 20 and was available to be viewed for free until March 28. It became an instant hit with audiences of all ages and was so popular with schools that educational viewing was extended until April 18.

Manitoba Hydro also donated three \$200 prize paks which contained a variety of safety, first aid, and emergency supplies and were awarded to three lucky viewers: Shirley Lowe, Beverley Emes-Macklin, and Sandra Komishon.

"EASTER HYMN" VIDEO

The value of the contributions of time, energy, and talent made by the individual members of the Manitoba Opera Chorus toward the success of our productions cannot be understated. Given that choral singing in any form may be one of the last activities to return once pandemic-related concerns begin to ease, it was important to recognize these valuable members of the community and to give our



chorus an opportunity in the 2020/21 season to do what they do so well - perform. We decided to invite the chorus to participate in a record-yourselfat-home video of the "Easter Hymn" from the opera Cavalleria Rusticana by Pietro Mascagni.

At the time, similar recording projects were being released regularly by choirs and various singing groups around the world. Rather than produce something resembling those other projects, we wanted to create a video that was unique. We engaged the services of videographer and filmmaker Laina Brown to conceive a visual concept that would speak to the themes of spring: renewal, regrowth, and rebirth. Local soprano, Lara Ciekiewicz, was engaged to sing the soprano solo.

Chorus Master, Tadeusz Biernacki, led the chorus through a series of online rehearsals via Zoom, and once they were prepared, they each made a series of recordings of themselves performing the work. Audio engineer Joe Dudych took each of the individual recordings and combined their audio tracks to produce a single audio track, while Laina Brown used the chorus video footage, as well as footage shot in and

around the ruins of the Trappist monastery in St. Norbert to produce the final product.

The video was released online on April 2, 2021 (Good Friday). To date, it has been viewed over 16,000 times on Facebook.

THE SOLO SESSIONS VIDEO SERIES

We had planned to present Puccini's *Tosca* in the spring of 2021. We decided to cancel the production early in the year when it became apparent that it would not be possible to produce. Performing for a live audience was not an option due to Provincial COVID-19 restrictions on public gatherings; another streamed concert with the WSO was not possible as they had reduced their performance roster of musicians into smaller cohorts: and it was not possible to bring artists in from outside the province due to their need to guarantine for 14 days upon arrival.


In place of this mainstage production, we decided to make video recordings featuring five local artists and their collaborative pianists in recital - some of whom would not be familiar to Manitoba Opera audiences and featuring some repertoire choices that falls well outside the norm for an opera company. Aaron Hutton (tenor) with Lisa Rumpel (piano) presented a selection of early 20th century English parlour songs. The program from James McLennan (tenor) and Laura Loewen (piano) included a song by Manitoba-born composer, Jocelyn Morlock, and an aria from John Corigliano's opera,

The Ghosts of Versailles. Lizzy Hoyt (mezzo-soprano) and Lisa Rumpel (piano) performed a mix of traditional English folksong, Mozart, and French chansons. Stephanie Sy, with Seanne Buenefe (piano), gave us a sampling of contemporary music-theatre selections. Singer/ actress Lisa Bell let loose with a set of rhythm and blues and Motown classics with Carlin Lemon (piano), Julian Bradford (bass), and Rob Siwik (drums).

Our film production partners on this project were Linda Nelson and Norm Lussier at YaYo Productions. Awardwinning Manitoba film director Deco Dawson was engaged to conceptualize and film each of the performers' selections. We filmed the various performers over five days - one artist and their collaborator(s) per day - on the stage of the Centennial Concert Hall while observing COVID safety protocols as established by the Manitoba film industry. The recordings and footage were mixed and edited, and the final product was released online via Vimeo in early June.

Manitoba Opera remains proud of the relationships it has developed over the years with many of North America's finest artists. The company continues to offer exciting opportunities for both established and emerging artists to develop their craft, and MO's production department strives to create an environment where these artists can do their best work.

We will be honoured to once again welcome these artists to the company. We look forward to the day



we can bring these great stories, told through beautiful music, to life once more.

ALL THOSE ARIAS: THE GAME SHOW VIDEO SERIES

We were approached by our friends at the Little Opera Company of Winnipeg (LOC) and given the opportunity to lend financial, technical, and administrative assistance to a project of theirs – a threepart video series entitled *All Those Arias: The Game Show.*

Conceived, written, and directed by Winnipeg-based director Robert Herriot, the project was recorded over a period of five days at the RMTC Tom Hendry Warehouse Digital Studio with an in-house video/ audio crew. Among the local performers featured in the series were mezzo-soprano Lizzy Hoyt, and sopranos Dawn Bruch-Wiens, Lara Ciekiewicz, Tracy Dahl, Andrea Lett, and Lara Secord-Haid.

This series was released in early spring, 2021.





COMPANY SELECTED TO PARTICIPATE IN NATIONAL PILOT PROGRAM TO MEASURE THE IMPACT OF OPERA

In February, Manitoba Opera was selected as one of six Canadian opera companies to participate in the pilot program for the Association for Opera in Canada's Opera Impact Platform.

The Opera Impact Platform is a data collection tool designed by Sametrica (software firm) with Good Roots Consulting (strategy and evaluation firm dedicated to helping nonprofits), that will help standardize the way that opera companies collect and report data, primarily through surveys. This will help to better understand the civic impact and resilience of Canadian opera companies, both locally in their home communities and in the national landscape.

Manitoba Opera is no stranger to utilizing this tool as the company has collected data through anonymous surveying of patrons for our main stage, education, community engagement, and special events/fundraising programming for years.

As participants in the pilot program, MO staff were able to help guide the design of survey tools for measuring the impact of programs in those areas. Those tools will be ready for use by the six companies in the Opera Impact Platform pilot in the fall with the aim of then releasing the survey tools to the wider opera community.

The goal of this pilot project is to make it easier for opera companies to quantify the impact that their programming has for their many constituent groups, and to report on that impact to funders, sponsors, and other stakeholders using consistent language and questions.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

In response to the cancellation of live performances and their related community engagement activities, Manitoba Opera created a series of virtual experiences to maintain connections to the community.

OPERA IN THE GARDEN

The first community engagement offering combined two of life's beautiful things: gardens and opera into a three-part video series of show-stopping gardens topped off with vocal performances at each site.

Launched in October, the approximately 20-minute videos featured a virtual walk around each property with the owner and plant enthusiast Colleen Zacharias, the *Winnipeg Free Press* gardening columnist and Certified Prairie Horticulturalist/ Certified Master Gardener.

Plans and inspiration for the gardens, challenges

and successes, along with gardening advice were shared. This was interwoven with a selection of opera favourites and contemporary works sung by sopranos Lara Ciekiewicz and Jessica Kos-Whicher, and tenor James McLennan.

EPISODE 1: ARMSTRONG'S POINT

Nestled in the historic Armstrong's Point neighborhood, this lush smaller garden packs in a variety of colourful annuals, perennials, shrubs, and trees and has had to adapt to a changing environment with the removal of beloved Elm trees in recent years.

EPISODE 2: ASSINIBOINE LANDING

Overlooking the Assiniboine River just west of Winnipeg, this contemporary residence's garden focal point is a pond complete with a bridge. With numerous seating areas to relax in sun or shade, there's always a chance of spotting visiting wildlife. The property fronts in this neighborhood also feature a wide variety of naturalized prairie plants' boulevard.

EPISODE 3: MCCREARY ROAD

Featuring soprano Jessica Kos-Whicher, accompanied by Lisa Rumpel

An English garden with fountains, contemporary swimming pool, and country property combine to provide a restful retreat just minutes from city shopping and the Fort Whyte Centre. The gardens feature a riot of colourful perennials and annuals, and an impressive banana tree that overwinters in the basement.

Episodes were \$10 to view; \$25 for all three, plus GST.

BRAVO BOOK CLUB

This season Manitoba Opera hosted its first-ever book club. The Bravo Book Club, a club for opera lovers to discuss books about or relating to opera, met on Wednesday, February 3. The club gathered on Zoom to discuss the celebrated novel *Bel Canto* by Ann Patchett.

The hour-long discussion was moderated by Winnipeg-based journalist and educator Alison Gillmor and was attended by 14 patrons. Special guest soprano Lara Ciekiewicz was able to add a singer's perspective to the discussion. "Great idea - loved the film. Thanks for giving us at least some opera for those of us who are operadeprived currently."

VIRTUAL FILM SCREENING: BEL CANTO

On Saturday, February 6, Manitoba Opera hosted a free virtual screening of the 2018 film adaptation of the novel *Bel Canto*. Over 508 People logged on from home on their computers, tablets, internet TVs, and even cell phones to view the film.

Patrons were invited to participate in a discussion about the film later that day, hosted by Alison Gillmor. There were 28 patrons who convened via Zoom to share their thoughts and feedback on the movie.

VIRTUAL PAINT CLASS

Opera lovers know that opera isn't just about the beautiful music – it also captures audiences with stunning visuals imprinted upon the imagination. As a new way to engage our patrons, we hosted a virtual paint class on Sunday, February 21. Participants received all the necessary supplies delivered directly to their home.

The two-hour Zoom session, led by Kristen Treusch, an art historian who regularly holds in-person paint classes, was attended by 34 adventurous artists. Many were brand new to acrylic painting; others had some experience.

The artists were tasked with creating an Impressionistinspired version of a scene from Manitoba Opera's 2019 production of *La Traviata* and with Kristen's instruction, the aspiring Monets met the challenge!

THE WINNIPEG BOLDNESS PROJECT

The 2020/21 season marked the beginning of a new relationship with Indigenous-led social innovation organization The Winnipeg Boldness Project. The Winnipeg Boldness Project's "bold goal" is to have children and families in the Point Douglas Neighbourhood of Winnipeg experience dramatically improved well-being in all aspects of community and self: physical, emotional, mental, and spiritual.

Following a discussion with the project's director, Diane Roussin,

staff created a viewing experience around a screening of the MO video presentation of *The* Barber of Seville as Styled by Al Simmons that was tailored for members of The Winnipeg Boldness Project's Parent Guide Group. The Parent Guide Group includes five families with 16 children total who reside in Point Douglas. Manitoba Opera created snack packs and themed activities for these families that were delivered to their doorsteps to enhance their viewing experience. Following positive feedback from Boldness, we followed up with links to our Opera Storytime and Opera School videos. We hope to continue growing this partnership in future seasons.

STUDENT PROGRAMMING

As we could not bring singers into schools to participate in I Love to Read Month, we created Opera Storytime so students could listen to opera-related stories in a classroom, a day care, or at home.


With Opera Class workshops on hold this season, we created Opera School so students could discover how their talents and interests have a home in opera.

And who can forget Al Simmons' inventive and hilarious reimagining of his one-person school presentation of *The Barber of Seville*? The video version was enjoyed by thousands of kids of all ages when it was released for a limited engagement in March/April.

OPERA SCHOOL VIDEO SERIES

In recent years, our Opera Class workshops have been in high demand for students in grades 3 to 6. Even though we were unable to bring artists physically into schools this season to present this program, we remained committed to our mission to engage these students in discovering the magic of opera and the ways that their interests and talents can contribute to this powerful storytelling art form.

Opera School was one such project. This series of six short videos explore how an opera is made. In this series, students follow four young opera artists on their journey to learn about opera as they create their own version of Mozart's The Magic Flute. Opera School was filmed in February, directed by Rob Herriot and features soprano Jessica Kos-Whicher, mezzo-soprano Lizzy Hoyt, tenor Nolan Kehler, and baritone Nathan Sawatzky-Dyck. Jessica Kos-Whicher and Nathan Sawatzky-Dyck have both been Opera Class presenters in past seasons.

OPERA STORYTIME VIDEOS

Opera Storytime is a great introduction to opera for kindergarten to grade 4. This collection of four fun and engaging read-aloud videos features stories about animals who love opera - a cat and dog who both sing opera and a mouse who works at the world-renowned Metropolitan Opera House. The stories were brought to life by talented artists in our community including opera singers and a professional football player!

The project was developed in response to the need for at-home arts and literacy engagement for young children during the pandemic. The videos were available for educational viewing from March 5 through September 30, 2021.

DIDO AND AENEAS VIDEO

In the fall of 2020, the University of Manitoba (U of M) Desautels Faculty of Music Opera Theatre and Symphony Orchestra collaborated, despite the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, to create a one-ofa-kind production of Henry Purcell's Dido and Aeneas. The production featured an all-female cast. It was filmed with masked and physically distanced singers, as per the provincial guidelines for live performance at that time. Minimal costuming was used, and no set was employed - the action is driven

solely by Purcell's music and through the motion and gesture of the student performers.

Manitoba Opera created an online study guide that featured video segments recorded by U of M performers. In these segments, the cast and musicians speak directly to students about the elements that make up the opera and share their own experiences from the production. This created a unique opportunity for the performers to engage with their audience outside of a traditional performance setting, and for students to explore and digest the opera at their own pace.



DIGITAL EMERGING ARTISTS PROGRAM (DEAP)

MANITOBA OPERA LAUNCHES VITAL NEW DIGITAL PROGRAM FOR YOUNG ARTISTS

In the summer of 2020, Manitoba Opera embarked upon an ambitious goal: to launch a new program designed to help young opera artists step into the next stage of their careers, at a time when traditional learning and performing opportunities were unavailable due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Through its Digital Emerging Artists Program (DEAP), Manitoba Opera sought to connect emerging artists with leading professionals from across Canada. Participants were provided with the highest level of vocal instruction and artistic coaching, as well as instruction in creating digital media. Over the span of two months, through conversations with artists, teachers, and administrators of young artist programs for other arts organizations, the arc of the program came into focus.

The Digital Emerging Artists Program would be a four-week training intensive for young opera artists. The need for social distancing turned out to create a unique opportunity - since all lessons, classes, workshops, and collaboration would occur online, there was no need for participants to travel for the program. This allowed Manitoba Opera to bring together artists, instructors, and presenters from all over Canada. The program involved participants from Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Alberta, British Columbia, and Newfoundland, In all, over 40 artists and arts professionals found earning opportunities through this program that would not otherwise have existed. The core faculty consisted of sopranos Tracy Dahl and Monica Huisman, mezzo-soprano Marion Newman, and tenor John Tessier.

The program resonated with young Canadian artists eager

to explore the possibilities of learning and collaborating over digital platforms. There were 48 singers who applied for the 2020 session. Of those, four outstanding artists were selected by the core faculty, one from each voice type. The successful applicants were soprano Sydney Baedke, mezzo-soprano Lizzy Hoyt, tenor Kaden Forsberg, and baritone Nicholas Borg.

From August 4-28, these artists participated in opera training and technology workshops, and enjoyed professional and personal development across a variety of topics including financial advice, brand development, life coaching, and conversations with some





of Canada's leading opera performers. They experimented with digital media and collaborated on creative projects, finding new ways to connect their unique artistic perspectives. At the end of the four-week program, each of the emerging artists had prepared and recorded an audition video.

These artists went on to embrace new challenges and find new success in the subsequent season.

Nicholas Borg applied the skills he developed through the DEAP to take on video editing projects as a faculty member with Pacific Opera Victoria's Civic Engagement Quartet, and to lead digital production and fundraising initiatives as the Operations


Manager for the Amadeus Choir of Greater Toronto.





In celebration of his 96th birthday, Winnipeg arts advocate Dr. Douglas W. ORGANIZATIONAL ADVANCEMENT

Through investments in our people, advancements in our technology, and the exploration of inclusive practices, the board and staff work to create an invigorated opera company for the 21st century that resonates with its community.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

In September 2020, staff welcomed new trustees of Manitoba Opera at the annual Board Orientation session. Flavia Fernandez Fabio, Timothy E. Burt, and Terence Sakohianisaks Douglas attended the one-day, staff-led information session that equips board members with a thorough understanding of company operations and insights into the values and priorities that guide Manitoba Opera.

As the fall progressed, and in response to the pandemic, the board moved all its operations into a virtual format and conducted all business remotely for the 2020/21 season. The primary focus of the board was centered on strong financial management during the pandemic and establishing firm ground for the organization to re-emerge post-pandemic.

The 2020/21 season marked Elba Haid's final year as chair of Manitoba Opera. Elba was a remarkable chair and spearheaded major accomplishments for the company. Amongst her achievements: the elimination of a decades-old debt; the establishment of the Gail Asper Award to honour visionary leaders in our community; and laying the groundwork for the establishment of the Manitoba **Opera Endowment Fund** Campaign - the company's most ambitious fundraising campaign in its 48-year history. The board and staff look forward to Elba's continued guidance and leadership as she assumes the role of past chair.

After completing four full terms, Dr. Jeffrey Sisler retired

from the board. As an ardent advocate of Manitoba Opera, Dr. Sisler recruited many new supporters and subscribers to the organization. Under the trying circumstances of the pandemic, Dr. Sisler provided his guidance when he served on the Pandemic Protocol Working Group and developed the safety protocols and procedures for Manitoba Opera's Concert in the Cathedral Ruins.

These efforts included participating in and attending online sessions of close to 100 hours on everything from a bootcamp for the arts to cultivating civic engagement and social change, to how your brain uses bias.

Staff learning was not limited to mitigating the effects of the pandemic, however. In November, Annual Giving Manager Liz Miller and Grants & Corporate Giving Manager Jayne Hammond attended the



Association of Fundraising Professional's (AFP) NOT Congress. This Toronto-based fundraising conference was held entirely online for the first time and offered opportunities to learn from the sector's top leaders and network with non-profit professionals from across the country.

Through the fall, Tania Douglas, Director of Development, participated in the inaugural eight-week ArtsBoost Digital Marketing & Fundraising course. The 16-member cohort was made up of experienced arts marketers and fundraisers, chosen from a cross-section of performing arts organizations across Canada.

Jayne Hammond completed AFP's Fundamentals of Fundraising e-course in January 2021 after receiving a full scholarship from AFP's National Scholarship Program. The course provided an overview of skills and techniques for individuals at the beginning of their fundraising career. Jayne was paired with Heather Laser, Director of Development for the Manitoba Museum, for AFP Manitoba's Mentorship Program. Jayne also participated in online sessions: the Association for Fundraising Professional's workshop on Islam and Philanthropy and a panel discussion on anti-black racism in opera hosted by LA Opera.

In addition to his participation in the Opera America Education forums, Dr. Scott Miller, Education & Community Engagement Coordinator, participated in several online sessions that explored a variety of subjects including de-escalating conflict in the rehearsal space, opera as a tool for social justice, Latinx voices in opera, and the issues surrounding inherited repertoire.

Larry Desrochers completed an extended term of seven years as a member of the Board of Directors for Opera America,





As a Manitoba Mentor with Opera InReach, Javne is also working with artists across Canada to expand the civic impact of opera through education. The collective aims to uplift and nourish artistry through its core values of equity, diversity, inclusivity, justice, and accessibility.

Director of Development Tania Douglas is a member of the Manitoba Philanthropy Awards Selection Committee for the Association of Fundraising Professionals, Manitoba Chapter.

Conference participation, professional development, and participation in special initiatives and programs demonstrates Manitoba Opera's ongoing commitment to investing in the talent, leadership, and skills of its board and staff.

GOVERNANCE

The Governance Committee continued its regular review of governing documents and creation of new policy. Areas of focus this season included meeting frequency and the development of a board candidate assessment tool.

The Governance Committee dedicated much of the season to the exploration on the themes of inclusion, diversity, equity, and access, and how MO should embrace these concepts to further its service to the community. The work culminated in the formation of an organizational statement on diversity and guiding principles for the organization: We recognize and affirm the importance, value, and complexity of all human experience, and that to respectfully embrace such human experience, we consider diversity to be a core value of our organization and operations.

Our guiding principles recognize the responsibility to reflect the diversity of our community, the value of divergent opinion, and the obligation to continually educate our people and challenge our thinking.

We seek to discover, measure, assess, and expand our diversity and diversify our programming through the stories we tell, where we tell them. to whom we tell them, and those we invite to tell their stories.

BUILDING BRIDGES

This season marked the second year of Manitoba Opera's Building Bridges program - a multi-year project with the goal of beginning to develop relationships with Indigenous communities in Manitoba. This program is supported in part by a two-year grant from Opera's America's Innovation Program.

The project was designed with guidance from our Community Consultant Jessica Dumas. Jessica is a member of the Anishinaabe community from Keeseekowenin First Nation in Manitoba and is president of Jessica Dumas Coaching and Training. Jessica has experience in conflict resolution, social justice advocacy, public speaking, and Indigenous history awareness.

Following the tragic discoveries of unmarked graves at the sites of former residential schools in Canada this year,

Jessica made the understandable decision, for personal reasons, to remove herself from the profession of Indigenous education and facilitation. Jessica was instrumental in the early stages of Building Bridges, and Manitoba Opera was fortunate to have worked with her. With gratitude, Manitoba Opera wishes Jessica the best for her future endeavours.

With the pandemic greatly affecting communities in Manitoba, our ability to connect with people continues to be limited and the program was put on hiatus for the season. During this time, Manitoba Opera has continued to place an emphasis on continuing Indigenous education. Activities included participation in online sessions on land acknowledgements, a roundtable on Indigenous musical sovereignty, and the impacts of colonialism and historical trauma. Dr. Scott Miller, Education & Community Engagement Coordinator, participated in BMO's e-course Nisitohtamowin: An Introduction to Indigenous Perspectives in Canada.

During the 2020/21 season, Tania Douglas, Director of Development, also provided mentorship in fundraising and sponsorship to a young Indigenous student, as well as participated in pow wows and collaborated with the Aboriginal School of Dance on cross-cultural dance projects. Tania also participated in workshops hosted by The Circle on Indigenous Philanthropy and Reciprocity.

Other staff educational initiatives included reading 21 Things You Didn't Know About The Indian Act and Indigenous Relations: Insights, Tips & Suggestions to Make Reconciliation a Reality



by Bob Joseph and the 94 Calls to Action issued by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. Larry Desrochers, General Director & CEO also participated in the University of Alberta's online course Indigenous Canada - a 12-week course offered by the Faculty of Native Studies that explores Indigenous histories and contemporary issues in Canada.

ADVANCING DIGITAL & VIRTUAL CONTENT

The 2020/21 season marked Manitoba Opera's first foray into digital production, with the company presenting a collection of options including the live-streamed The Sopranos of Winnipeg concert, Opera in the Garden, Opera Storytime, and The Solo Sessions series.

MO has placed an increased emphasis on the development of digital content and virtual experiences going forward. To achieve this, the company made a commitment to developing the technical capacity and training of staff in order to enable staff to produce some of the digital programming in-house. Starting with an acquisition of high-quality

video and audio recording gear, the work will continue next season with the development of staff skills, by investing in training on cinematography, editing, and livestreaming.

By expanding the platforms we use to showcase opera, Manitoba Opera will be able to reach new audiences and a wider community.

FINANCE

FINANCE

Manitoba Opera posted an operating surplus of \$5,000 following a transfer of \$439,674 to its board-designated Operating Reserve Fund. Manitoba Opera's budget for FY2021 was \$1,907,385. Management anticipates a significant draw down of the **Operating Reserve Fund to** support activities for FY2022.

GRANTS

Operational funding from the Manitoba Arts Council, Province of Manitoba, and Winnipeg Arts Council remained the same at \$220,000, \$150,000, and \$121,500, respectively, with the amount received from the Canada Council for the Arts at \$255,000.

Throughout the course of the year, Manitoba Opera accessed various government programs in response to the COVID-19

pandemic. Most notably was \$309,290 from the Canadian Emergency Wage Subsidy; \$63,800 from the Canada Council for the Arts; and \$50,000 from the Winnipeg Foundation Stabilization Grant. Manitoba Opera also accessed a combined \$60,047 from the Province of Manitoba's Back to Work, Safe at Home Manitoba, and the Manitoba Bridge Grant programs, and the Canadian Emergency Rent Subsidy.




FUNDRAISING

As with the previous year, fundraising events were either postponed or held virtually. Dinner at De Luca's, rescheduled from the prior season, was held as a stay-at-home event in June of 2020. The Gail Asper Award, honoring Mrs. Tannis M. Richardson, was moved to the fall of 2021.

Through the generosity of patrons, \$90,745 was donated back in gift-inkind ticket donations and special event admissions.

Total fundraising from all operating campaigns for 2020/21 totalled \$649,495. Gifts from individuals including Camerata and Friends were \$279,667. Corporate sponsorships and donations totalled \$152,500. Gifts from foundations totalled \$155,000. Funds raised from special events totalled \$27.091.

BOX OFFICE

Due to COVID-19, the 2020/21 season was modified to continue operating under provincial public health orders. Subscribers who had purchased tickets for Sweeney Todd and Tosca were given the opportunity to have their account credited, get a refund, or receive a tax receipt. The Sopranos of Winnipeg, a livestream concert held in November, generated \$21.673 in box office revenues.





Manitoba Opera also benefitted from two other fundraisers: a 50/50 lottery with net proceeds of \$3,304 and Dr. MacEwan's Walk for the Arts which raised \$31,933 for the company.

IN-KIND SPONSORSHIPS & COMPLIMENTARY TICKETS

In the normal course of operations, Manitoba Opera exchanges tickets for its productions in consideration for various goods and services. These transactions are accounted for in the statement of operations at the fair value of the tickets exchanged. This season that amounted to \$0 due to the continuance of COVID-19 and the public health order restrictions that prohibited the company's ability to hold live performances.

EXPENSES

Overall, savings were achieved in all departmental budgets. Administration did see an increase in expenses due to the work being done on the endowment campaign, as well as an increase in fundraising. These were offset by the deduction in expenditures in marketing.

ENDOWMENT FUND

To help solidify the long-term future of Manitoba Opera, the Board of Trustees established an endowment fund through The Winnipeg Foundation. Launched in 2009/10, gifts made to the Manitoba Opera Endowment Fund will grow over time and provide a significant stream of revenue to help the company continue to serve the community with meaningful and inspiring programming.

During the fiscal period ending May 31, 2021, the fund grew to \$765,196 from \$450,303 at the end of the FY2020.



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

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
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
