

## **OUR MISSION:**

## TO CHANGE PEOPLE'S LIVES THROUGH THE GLORY OF OPERA

Manitoba Opera is located upon, and operates within, Treaty #1 territory, the Anishinaabeg, Cree, Anisininew, Dakota, and Dene peoples' traditional lands and waters and the Red River Métis Nation homelands.

As water nourishes the land and all it gives us, we also acknowledge that the source of the City of Winnipeg's water is from Shoal Lake, the home and shared territory of Iskatewizaagegan No. 39 Independent Nation and Shoal Lake 40 First Nation.

In view of such understandings and acknowledgments, Manitoba Opera remains committed to working in partnership with the Indigenous peoples in the spirit of truth, reconciliation, and collaboration.



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# Manitoba Opera's 51st season was a year for firsts: artistically, educationally, and with our community engagement programs.

Artistically, Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North was the first Indigenous-led creation on a Canadian opera mainstage, and Carmen was the first opera that was both cancelled and returned post-pandemic. In education, we presented the first Opera Storytime video translated into Ojibway. In community engagement, we worked with our first Indigenous Advisory Council and commissioned our first Indigenous beaded artwork.

The season created space to celebrate Métis culture and welcome Indigenous communities into the Concert Hall, while also using traditional repertoire to rebuild audiences. Each production featured three performances and a student-attended dress rehearsal.

The Manitoba Opera-built production and world premiere of the first Indigenous-led opera on a Canadian mainstage, *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North* opened the season in November.

Sixty-five percent of the 218 cast and crew identified as Indigenous. The production attracted patrons from across the country including Indigenous communities in Northern Manitoba.


We prioritized the inclusion of Indigenous artists, hiring our first Métis stage director to ensure authenticity on stage. We focused on Indigenous leadership throughout the production process, ensuring Indigenous artists felt supported. This involved extra time for "visiting," hiring cultural advisors such as Indigenous language keepers and elders onsite for trauma support.

Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North was not just a performance, but

a significant cultural event that extended its impact beyond the stage. The production required meaningful engagement with the Métis community, guided by a 12-member advisory committee that met multiple times from March to October. Production ambassadors Keely McPeek and Camryn Dewar actively engaged Indigenous communities, performing excerpts from the opera at various events, reaching nearly 6,000 people. Métis elders played a crucial role, performing ceremonial duties before performances to honor cultural traditions.

Community workshops and events further enriched the audience's experience. A beading workshop led by Métis artist Claire Johnston,







a Michif cooking event, an evening of learning and dialogue, and the pre-show chats provided additional layers of cultural context. The display of period-accurate outfits provided by Parks Canada added a historical dimension to the opera-going experience.

Additionally, Manitoba Opera commissioned beaded artwork by Claire Johnston, displayed in the lobby, and Liz Barron curated the art exhibit 21st Century Métis: Art, Identity & Innovation, which featured works by Jason Baerg, David Garneau, Amanda Smart, and Claire Johnston, exploring the evolving Métis identity.

Notably, the Manitoba Métis Federation listed *Li Keur* as the second most impactful achievement in advancing the Red River Métis in 2023, only behind recognizing Louis Riel as the first Premier of Manitoba.

We fostered community connections to welcome diverse audiences to a traditional Eurocentric art form. Our Opera Access program grew by 300%, offering free or subsidized tickets to mostly Indigenous patrons. More than 44% of attendees were new to Manitoba Opera.

Carmen returned in April 2024, four years after a pandemic-related delay. Rising star mezzo-soprano Ginger Costa-Jackson gave a "smoldering" performance (The Free Press) to sold-out audiences. Carmen delighted traditional opera enthusiasts while captivating casual ticket buyers. Our focus remained on the opera's exceptional music and drama, while also connecting its themes to contemporary issues, including a panel discussion on intimate partner violence.

However, we have experienced a significant rise in production costs, primarily driven by inflation. The pandemic has exacerbated the gap between ticket revenue and expenses. Our April 2024 production of *Carmen* cost 33% more than just 10 years ago but generated nearly identical ticket revenue. We will need to work with governments and other supporters to ensure we have the necessary resources to continue our important cultural work in the community.

We maintained our commitment to inclusivity by continuing to welcome audiences from remote Manitoban communities to opera performances. A special highlight was the visit from the treble choir of Mantou Sakahigan Kiskinamakewickamik. These students traveled from God's Lake Narrows First Nation to Winnipeg to see *Carmen* and we were able to enhance their experience with a backstage tour, a pizza dinner, and a singing workshop with award-winning Cree mezzo-soprano Rhonda Head.

In 2023/24, Manitoba Opera furthered its reputation as a sector-leading regional opera company in North America. Manitoba Opera's community engagement efforts this season reached more than 11,000 individuals through various events, initiatives, and exhibits. These activities not only expanded the reach of opera but also enriched the cultural fabric of the community. Educational programs played a

pivotal role, engaging approximately 4,000 students and providing many with their first exposure to this multifaceted art form.

The 2023/24 season also marked the second year of the Student Ambassador Program, a unique initiative by Manitoba Opera offering post-secondary music students an exclusive behind-the-scenes experience. The program allowed students from the University of Manitoba and Canadian Mennonite University to explore careers in arts administration while sharing their passion for opera with their peers and earning compensation.

The 4th annual Digital Emerging Artists Program (DEAP) unfolded over four weeks in August 2023, offering a groundbreaking training experience for four Emerging Artists and one Independent Learner. Conducted virtually via Zoom, DEAP 2023 united artists and faculty from across Canada. Participants benefited from over 600 hours of intensive instruction and professional development, while the program facilitated earning opportunities for 48 artists and arts professionals.


This season marked the fourth year of Manitoba Opera's Building Bridges project, designed to develop strong connections with Indigenous communities in Manitoba. Supported by Opera America's Innovation Grant program, the company continued its work building on the foundation

laid by Rhonda Forgues of Spirited Ways Consulting, who served as a consultant for two seasons on the project. In November 2023, Manitoba Opera became a signatory to the Winnipeg Indigenous Accord, committing to four Calls of Action through our 2023/24 season.

The 2023/24 season showcased Manitoba Opera's dedication to artistic innovation, community engagement, and education.
Through a diverse array of productions, educational initiatives, and community programs, Manitoba Opera reinforced its role as a cultural cornerstone in the region, bringing the transformative power of opera to a wide and varied audience.

The work we undertake to present great art, engage the community, and offer education programs to students, as well as emerging professionals, would not be possible without the generous support of our individual donors, corporate





partners, and investments from all three levels of government. We are grateful for the community coming together to support opera in Manitoba.

In closing, we want to express our profound gratitude to all the Indigenous partners we worked with this season, the artists, language and knowledge keepers, elders, and the Advisory Committee. Our work with you made this a profound and rewarding journey.











# ASSOCIATION FOR OPERA IN CANADA NATIONAL SUMMIT HELD IN WINNIPEG DURING LI KEUR

The Association for Opera in Canada (AOC) held its annual National Summit in conjunction with *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North*. Over three days in November, delegates from across Canada convened in Winnipeg to discuss pressing issues facing the sector including leadership in the opera field, boards and governance, and past and current trends in a changing world.

Manitoba Opera supported the summit by assisting with theme and session development, assisting with hosting the national opera auditions, and providing volunteer resources for AOC to manage conference sessions. The summit concluded with delegates attending the second performance of *Li Keur*.







In the 2023/24 season, we were pleased to return to presenting opera on a grand scale, with large ensemble casts made up of world-class local, national, and international artists onstage, the wonderful Manitoba Opera Chorus (with the addition of some welcome newcomers), and the full Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra in the pit.

Programming was reflective of current trends in the opera sector in North America, featuring a blend of something new (an exciting and ground-breaking world premiere) and something not-so-new (the long-awaited return of a much beloved audience favourite). Both productions were equally well received by the near-capacity audiences in attendance.

As the effects of the pandemic began to wane, the opportunity to produce this new work, a first-ever Canadian mainstage production of a work created by an Indigenous-led creative team, presented itself in the fall of 2023.

The opera is written in a storytelling style familiar to Indigenous peoples based on the concept of 'visiting,' and features both spoken dialogue and sung sections. Traditional and contemporary Métis fiddle tunes composed by Alex Kusturok are combined with contemporary vocal and orchestral music composed by Neil Weisensel.

Indigenous languages (Southern Michif, French Michif, and Anishinaabemowin) are interwoven with both French and English to create the narrative. The creation and the production of the opera would not have been possible without the wisdom, knowledge, and support of the translators, language keepers and coaches who worked on the project: Donna Beach, Debra Beach Ducharme, June Bruce, Agathe Chartrand, Jules Chartrand, Lorraine Coutu, Verna de Montigny, Joyce Dumont, Francois Fontaine, Patsy Miller, Andrea Rose, Heather Souter, and Suzanne Zeke.

The opera consists of scenes set in contemporary times as well as historical scenes set in southern Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and northern Montana during the 1870s. At the heart of the story is a visit between a young contemporary

## PRODUCTION:

LI KEUR: RIEL'S HEART OF THE NORTH

Prior to the onset of the pandemic, we were approached by Winnipeg composer Neil Weisensel with a newly written opera entitled *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North.*The story and libretto of the opera were conceived and written by Vancouver-based Red River Métis historian and scholar, Dr. Suzanne M. Steele, and it was co-composed with Métis fiddler Alex Kusturok.





Métis woman, Joséphine-Marie (Charlene Van Buekenhout, Winnipeg) and her grandmother, Mémère (Paulette Duguay, Winnipeg). Through their conversation, the audience is transported back in time and introduced to the historical figure of Louis Riel (Evan Korbut. Toronto), as well as three women who would play pivotal roles in Riel's life: Marie Serpente, an Anishinaabeg knowledge keeper (Keely McPeek, Winnipeg), Josette La Grande, a Métis sharpshooter (Rebecca Cuddy, Toronto), and Marguerite, the young woman who would become Riel's wife (Julie Lumsden, Winnipeg). Additional historical characters include Riel's friend. La Roche (Nolan Kehler. Winnipeg), Josette's father, Pierre La Grande (David Watson, Winnipeg), and An Englishman (James McLennan, Winnipeg). Throughout the narrative, Riel is confronted and challenged by two mystic and supernatural characters, the Black Geese of Fate (Michelle

Lafferty, Calgary and Scott Rumble, Woodstock, ON). As the story progresses, the audience witnesses Joséphine-Marie come to embrace her Métis heritage through a renewed appreciation of the independence and fortitude of the Métis peoples and their kinship at li keur (the heart) of the continent.

Winnipeg Métis and two-spirit director Simon Miron was the stage director. Co-composer and Winnipegger Neil Weisensel led the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, with Vancouver-born Monica Chen as assistant conductor. Alberta-based co-composer and fiddler, Alex Kusturok, appeared onstage alongside fiddler, Melissa St. Goddard (Portage la Prairie), and guitarist Jordan McConnell (Winnipeg). Under Alex's guidance, this trio led the orchestra in some sections of the opera.

Vancouver-based Métis choreographer Yvonne Chartrand worked

with a cast of local, national, and international dancers: Danielle Enblom, Modeste McKenzie, Élise Page, Ryan Richard, and Jera Wolfe. Winnipeg's Jacqueline Loewen was the fight director. Winnipeg-based Métis musicians and educators Steve Denby (adults) and Jennifer Engbrecht (children) were the chorus directors. The adult and children's choruses themselves were made up primarily of volunteers from the local Métis and First Nations community, some of whom were appearing onstage in a production for the very first time. The dedication and hard work of this group of newcomers is noteworthy.

The creative team was supported by two Edmonton-based designers: T. Erin Gruber (sets/projections) and Deanna Finnman (costumes), as well as Winnipeg's own Scott Henderson (lighting). Their work would not have been possible without the creative assistance and guidance from Evan Ducharme (costume design cultural consultant), Samay Arcentales Cajas (assistant projection designer), Monica Chen (assistant conductor), Corinna Wolf (visual artist), and Gregory Scofield (historian and archivist).

## **PRODUCTION:**

CARMEN

After having been cancelled in the spring of 2020 due to the onset of the pandemic, Bizet's *Carmen* was finally produced in the spring of 2024.

Based on a novella by Prosper Mérimée, and with a French libretto by Henri Meilhac and Ludovic Halévy, the opera tells the story of the downfall of Don José (David Pomeroy, St John's, NFLD), a young soldier who is seduced by the fiery and free-spirited cigarette factory worker, Carmen (Ginger Costa Jackson, Wyoming, US). José abandons his childhood sweetheart, Micaëla (Lara Ciekiewicz, Winnipeg), and deserts from his military duties to join forces with a band of smugglers including Frasquita



(Lara Secord Haid, Winnipeg/ Germany), Mercédès (Barbara King, Calgary), Le Remendado (Jacques Arsenault, Charlottetown, PEI), and Le Dancaïre (Johnathon Kirby, Toronto). Ultimately, their relationship becomes fraught as Carmen loses interest in José and Don José becomes increasingly obsessed with Carmen. When Carmen eventually chooses the bullfighter Escamillo (Daniel Okulitch, Ottawa/Calgary/ Germany) over Don José, the former solider stabs her to death.

Originally slated to direct the production in 2020, Edmonton's Brian Deedrick returned as stage director. Manitoba Opera's Music Advisor and Principal Conductor, Tyrone Paterson returned to lead the members of the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra. Winnipegbased choreographer Brenda Gorlick, and fight director Jacqueline Loewen, assisted in the staging of the action. Assistant Music Director and Chorus Master. Tadeusz Biernacki prepared the adult chorus while Carolyn Boyes was responsible for the children's chorus. Eve Legault (Ottawa) was

the assistant conductor and made an invaluable contribution behind the scenes as a French language dialogue coach.

Originally set in Spain in the early 19th century, our production (a rental from Edmonton Opera), with a set design by Camellia Koo and costumes by Deanna Finnman, was updated to the era of the Spanish civil war. Longtime Winnipeg-based lighting designer, Hugh Conacher, made his Manitoba Opera debut with this production.

Throughout its history, Manitoba Opera has proudly developed relationships with many of North America's finest artists. Moving forward, we will continue to offer exciting opportunities to both established and emerging artists. Manitoba Opera's Production Department will continue to strive to create and maintain an environment where these artists can do their best work. Manitoba Opera remains honored to present these artists to the community, and to continue to tell remarkable stories - told through beautiful music - to life.

## LI KEUR: RIEL'S HEART OF THE NORTH ANNOUNCED AT 2023/24 SEASON MEDIA CONFERENCE

A special media conference was held to announce that the company would be presenting *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North* as part of our 2023/24 Season. As the first Indigenous-led opera presented on a Canadian opera mainstage, this was a significant moment for both Manitoba Opera and the Canadian opera sector, in terms of our reconciliation journey and history.

The event was held April 14, 2023, on the Centennial Concert Hall's Piano Nobile. Larry Desrochers, General Director & CEO, was emcee, with Board of Trustees Chair Judith Chambers and Secretary Terence Sakohianisaks Douglas (video pre-record) speaking on behalf of the company.

An opening prayer was given by Paulette Duguay, president of l'Union national métisse Saint-Joseph. Ms. Duguay also relayed how important this work was to the Métis community in Manitoba.

Nicole Stonyk, representing librettist Dr. Suzanne M. Steele who was unable to attend due to ill health, and co-composers Neil Weisensel and Alex Kusturok spoke on behalf of the creative team and Kristen Kennedy, Regional Vice President, Winnipeg, BMO, underwriters of the production, spoke of the over a decade-long partnership that BMO has with MO and the importance of supporting this work with a ground-breaking contribution.

Invited guests and members of the media were treated to an excerpt from the opera, "The Mending of Violence" aria sung by soprano Keely McPeek (Marie Serpente in the production). She was accompanied on piano by musician and co-composer Neil Weisensel. Awarding-winning fiddler and co-composer of the work, Alex Kusturok, also performed.

Feast, an Indigenous-owned caterer, provided light refreshments.













## COMMUNITY PRICING INITIATIVE

In conjunction with the Opera Access program, a new initiative - Community Pricing - was launched with *Li Keur*. Through this initiative, \$20 tickets were made available for community members who self-identified their need to access subsidized tickets.

To manage this program, Alice Macgregor, a former student ambassador, was hired to connect with members of the community and promote the program. Starting in October, Alice reached out to over 150 organizations about the Opera Access program. There were 196 tickets provided at the discounted rate.

Manitoba Opera also donated 94 tickets to non-profit organizations for their fundraising activities in the community.





During the 2023/24 season, over 11,000 people experienced the events, initiatives, and exhibits that were part of Manitoba Opera's Community Engagement activities.

## Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North

In order to extend this production's impact beyond its performances, it was critical to have input from the Métis community in terms of shaping the company's role in this venture and creating meaningful community engagement activities.

## ADVISORY COMMITTEE

An advisory community was assembled with the mandate to provide guidance in the development of these activities, advise on culturally appropriate protocols throughout all stages of the initiative, act as ambassadors for the project, and facilitate connections between Manitoba Opera and Métis organizations and leaders. The 12-member *Li Keur* Advisory Committee, along with staff members, convened six times from March through October.

## PRODUCTION AMBASSADORS

Soprano Keely McPeek who sang the role of Marie Serpente in the production and soprano Camryn Dewar who was in the chorus and understudied for the role of Josette, served as production ambassadors for *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North*.

## ELDERS - CEREMONIAL DUTIES

Before the curtain rose at each performance of *Li Keur: Riel's Heart* of the North, as well as at the start of each of the pre-show dinners that were hosted on performance evenings, Métis elders were invited to perform ceremonial duties that included opening prayers and addresses. Prayers were given in English and in French Michif.

The Student Night performance on November 16 included a special dedication to Louis Riel, as on that date Métis across Canada observe the anniversary of Riel's execution in 1885. Additionally, when the Honourable Anita R. Neville, Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba, entered the hall for the opening night performance on November 18, the Viceregal Salute was performed on solo fiddle.

## BEADING WORKSHOP

Sunday, October 15 St. Boniface Museum

Red River Métis beadwork artist Claire Johnston led an afternoon of visiting and creating Métis two-needle style flat stitch beadwork. During the workshop, Claire shared about her family, the living legacy of Métis beadwork, and guided participants in making their own Métis flower pin with antique beads and traditionally smoked moose hide.

## MICHIF COOKING EVENT Saturday, October 21 Churchill Park United Church

Participants prepared a traditional Michif meal: Les boulettes (large meatballs), vegetables, bread pudding with brown sugar sauce and Bannock, under the supervision of *Li Keur* Advisory Committee members June Bruce, Agathe Chartrand, Lorraine Coutu, and Andrea Taillieu, along with

Suzanne Zeke. Once preparations were complete and the food was cooking, participants were treated to a performance of music from *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North* by Keely McPeek and Camryn Dewar, storytelling by Andrea Taillieu, and browsed an interpretive display of Métis cultural artefacts curated by the Louis Riel Institute.

## AN EVENING OF LEARNING & DIALOGUE

Wednesday, November 15 St. Ignatius Parish

This evening of learning and conversation presented as part of an ongoing dialogue circle between St. Kateri Tekakwitha Indigenous Parish and St. Ignatius Parish featured a presentation by Dr. Suzanne M. Steele, as well as entertainment by mezzo-soprano Hailey Witt, and Ramsey Rae and

### PRE-SHOW CHATS

Thirty minutes prior to the curtain at each performance of *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North* audiences were treated to a 20-minute presentation to contextualize the new opera. At Opening Night, Ella Speckeen, a fiddler and the daughter of librettist Dr. Suzanne M. Steele, was in conversation with Dr. Monique Giroux, Canada Research Chair in Métis Music and Associate Professor in Music at the University of Lethbridge in Alberta.

On Wednesday, November 22, Ella spoke again and gave a short performance. Closing Night featured a presentation by Firearms Safety Coordinator Dave Brown.

## LI KEUR BEADED ARTWORK BY CLAIRE JOHNSTON

Manitoba Opera commissioned Red River Métis beadwork artist Claire Johnston to create a beaded replica of the *Li Keur* artwork. The original design was the work of The Show and Tell agency creative team (formerly known as McKim Communications Group).

The art piece took nearly three months to complete and was displayed in the lobby for patrons to view during the production run. This beautiful art will continue to celebrate Métis culture, creativity, and contributions to modern opera as it is made available for touring to exhibits within and outside Winnipeg.

## TRAUMA-INFORMED APPROACH TO THE ARTS

Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North is first and foremost a celebration of Métis culture and community. However, the opera does contain scenes that reference events in Métis history that were traumatic for those who experienced them and have been the root of generational trauma that continues to impact Métis communities.

In recognition of this, Manitoba
Opera provided information in the
program about trauma and arranged
to have two elders: Beverly Lee and
Norman Meade in the lobby during
intermission and after the show
to speak with anyone who might
be triggered by these themes and
needed to talk with someone.

In conjunction with the Red River Métis Marketplace, patrons were able to purchase a variety of products available from Métis artisans who were featured in the lobby before the show and during intermission at performances of *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North*.

## ART EXHIBITION - 21ST CENTURY MÉTIS: ART, IDENTITY & INNOVATION

An art exhibit, 21st Century Métis: Art, Identity & Innovation opened on Closing Night of *Li Keur* on Friday, November 24 at the Concert Hall. Manitoba Opera was proud to have this exhibit, curated by Liz Barron, a member of the Advisory Committee, coincide with the world premiere of *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North*.

The exhibition featured the works of Jason Baerg, David Garneau, Amanda Smart, and Claire Johnston and explored the vibrant and everevolving Métis identity. The artists' powerful narratives and innovative expressions illuminated the complex interplay between heritage, culture, and the path forward.

## COLLABORATION WITH PARKS CANADA

Li Keur presented a unique opportunity for Manitoba Opera and Parks Canada to work together in showcasing Red River Métis culture and history.

In advance of the premiere, selections from the production were performed by Production Ambassadors Keely McPeek and Camryn Dewar at Riel House National Historic Site during the annual Corn Roast, as well as during Nuit Blanche at The Forks National

Historic Site where they were joined by fiddler Melissa St. Goddard who also performed in the opera.

Throughout the run of the production, a display of period-accurate outfits provided by Parks Canada was displayed at the Concert Hall. The clothing represented what was historically worn by the Red River Métis at the time in which the opera was set. At each performance, Parks Canada staff, dressed in period-accurate clothing, were also in the lobby interacting with patrons.

### CAST INTERVIEWS

In August, Barney Morin, Indigenous Initiatives Co-ordinator for Festival du Voyageur, sat down with members of the principal cast and creative team of *Li Keur* to record a series of three video interviews. These conversations, some in French and some in English, were freely accessible online, and provided insights into the creation of the opera and the Indigenous perspectives that shaped the production.

## SOIRÉE-CAUSERIE *LI KEUR* Thursday, December 7 Université de Saint-Boniface

Following the close of *Li Keur*, co-composer Neil Weisensel and cast members Paulette Duguay (Mémère) and James McLennan (The Englishman/La Crosse), along with emcee University of St. Boniface President Sophie Bouffard, had a conversation about the production of this new work.







## Carmen

UNDERSTANDING THE MUSIC Sunday, March 17 Canadian Museum for Human Rights

In this presentation, Dr. Colette Simonot-Maiello examined how composer Georges Bizet used music not only to evoke the Spanish setting of his opera *Carmen*, but also to characterize Carmen as an "exotic outsider." Issues of opera genre as they impacted the history of this work in the late 19th century were also explored.

## STORYTELLING THROUGH THE TAROT

Tuesday, March 19 First Unitarian Universalist Church of Winnipeg

In the opera, the title character foresees doom for herself and her former lover when she reads her future in the cards. Psychic medium and astrologer Bernice Bisson gave a presentation in which she discussed the tarot and numerology, exploring the role of interpreting the major arcana to offer insights into major events in one's life.

## PANEL DISCUSSION: CARMEN AND INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE

Saturday, March 23 Carol Shields Auditorium, Millennium Library

The conflict of the opera *Carmen* centers on the relationship between Carmen and her lover Don José, which tragically ends in violence and the death of Carmen at the hand of José. A panel of experts who counsel the victims and perpetrators of intimate partner violence offered their perspectives on this subject.

Dr. Sophie Bouffard, president of the Université de Saint-Boniface, gave a lecture about Bizet's most acclaimed opera. Dr. Bouffard was able to offer her perspective as a musicologist and as a performer, having studied *Carmen* and performed the role of Micaëla herself.

## PRE-SHOW CHATS

Pre-show chats for Carmen were presented a half-hour before curtain at each performance by guest speaker Nicole Stonyk, BA Music, BA Arts, MA Indigenous Studies. Ms. Stonyk is a classically trained pianist/musician who appeared in the chorus for Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North. She is a PhD Indigenous Studies student at the University of Manitoba. Her research looks at ways of "decolonizing" Western musical performance within themes of possessive logics, Indigenous relationality, language, and aesthetics.





## FLAMENCO DANCE DEMONSTRATION

Patrons were treated each evening during the intermission to a demonstration of flamenco dance and music, presented on the Piano Nobile by dancers from Sol de España performing with flamenco guitarist Philippe Meunier.




## MO SUPPORTS 2024 PRIDE WEEK WITH CONCERT SPONSORSHIP

## DIGITAL EMERGING ARTISTS PROGRAM (DEAP)

The 4th annual Digital Emerging Artists Program (DEAP) took place over four weeks in August 2023. This innovative training program provided opportunities for four Emerging Artists and one Independent Learner to explore their creative agency as they learned from core faculty and guest artists, and developed and produced an opera video project in collaboration with a professional recording team.

The program helped artists develop the necessary tools to apply the stagecraft and vocal techniques used in live opera performances to video productions. At the same time, participants learned about digital production, audience management, personal branding, and other skills that they will use to manage their careers as opera artists.

Program activities were held virtually over Zoom, with artists and faculty joining from across Canada. This year's participants received over 600 hours of instruction and professional development, and the program provided earning opportunities for 48 artists and arts professionals.

This season's emerging artists produced and edited their own opera video projects with the support of professional recording teams. Projects were filmed in Winnipeg, Toronto, and Edmonton, using opera and art song to create compelling narratives in settings that included historic churches and cemeteries, forested parks, sandy beaches, and the interior of a fashion boutique.

The 2023 Independent Learner was Anisininew soprano Keely McPeek. Her work with DEAP faculty prepared her for her mainstage debut as Marie Serpente in the world premiere of *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North*, and connections made through the program brought her the opportunity to join Vancouver Operas' 2024 touring production of *Flight of the Hummingbird*.

Stephen Bell, who has been with DEAP since 2020 as a digital media specialist and videographer, was welcomed into the core faculty this season.

Manitoba Opera's Digital Emerging Artists Program has been generously supported by RBC Emerging Artists and the Gail Asper Family Foundation.



This season, approximately 4,000 students experienced opera through Student Night at the Opera, in-class workshops, and online content. For many, these were their first experiences with the art form.

## Student Night at the Opera

Student Night at the Opera is an opportunity for youth and post-secondary students to attend the final dress rehearsal of our mainstage productions at a reduced cost. Over 1,400 students from over 35 schools and youth organizations attended Student Night at the Opera this season; more than in any season since 2015.

In April, two lucky classrooms won a visit from mezzo-soprano Barbara King who sang the role of Mercédès in *Carmen*. Ms. King visited the International Student Program at Murdoch MacKay Collegiate and the Band Program at Gordon Bell High School for Q&A sessions with students who had attended the dress rehearsal for *Carmen*. She

answered questions about her career and memorable performance highlights, inspiring students to imagine how opera can bring them opportunities for travel and discovery.

## Opera Class

This season 15 Opera Class workshops were presented at seven schools. These free in-class workshops use hands-on activities to show students how opera is an intersection of many different art forms that relies on the creativity and cooperation of numerous people.

Each workshop is delivered by a teaching artist who develops a unique workshop curriculum, engaging with students through the use of props, costumes, and role play to bring stories and opera scenes to life right in the classroom. Workshops this season were offered in English and French and were presented by sopranos Jessica Kos-Whicher and Katherine Mayba and bass-baritone Stephen Haiko-Pena.


## I Love to Read Month

Each year Manitoba Opera participates in I Love to Read Month in Winnipeg schools by bringing opera singers into classrooms to read from children's books about opera-loving animals, teach students some Italian opera vocabulary, and of course, to demonstrate their powerful operatic voices!

This season soprano Keely McPeek and bass-baritone Stephen Haiko-Pena presented 35 I Love to Read Month sessions at 20 schools.

Ten of those workshops were presented for students in the Ojibwe Language Program classrooms at Louis Riel School Division. premiering a new translation of Opera Cat into Anishinaabemowin translated and read by John McLean. Those presentations were coordinated by Kelsey Lanaghan, Ojibwe Language Teacher with Louis Riel School Division, and were made possible by Councilor Brian Mayes and the City of Winnipeg through their generous support of a new translation project for Opera Storytime and I Love to Read Month.

## **Opera Storytime**

In 2021 Manitoba Opera created an online collection of videos which feature local artists reading aloud from children's books about operaloving animals, and this online library has grown each season since. Opera Storytime videos are freely available for educational use upon request.

In fall 2023, with the guidance of Kelsey Lanaghan, an Ojibway Language Teacher with the Louis Riel School Division, Manitoba Opera embarked on a project to have *Opera Cat* and *Encore, Opera Cat!* translated into the Ojibway language so that read-aloud videos could be produced in Ojibway. John McLean, Language & Technology

Developer, Manitoba First Nations Education Resource Centre Inc., translated the text and read the stories for this video project, which became available to educators in spring 2024.

This project was generously supported by Councilor Brian Mayes and the City of Winnipeg.

Permissions to produce *Opera Cat* and *Encore, Opera Cat!* in new translations have been graciously given by author Tess Weaver.

## Opera in a Trunk

The Opera in a Trunk program is a free classroom resource that lets teachers provide their students with the opportunity for hands-on learning about opera. Each Opera Trunk contains costumes, props, books, DVDs, CDs, and fun creative activities themed to a well-known opera: The Magic Flute, Hansel and Gretel, Carmen, La Bohème, Aida, or

The Daughter of the Regiment.

From September through June, eight schools borrowed Opera Trunks, including two outside of Winnipeg. In all, over 400 students in grades K-6 experienced opera through this program, many for the first time.

## Balanced Experiential Education Program (BEEP)

Once again, this year Manitoba
Opera participated in Seven Oaks
School Division's BEEP summer
program, contributing to the
division's performing arts week
activities by presenting workshops
at three elementary schools: O.
V. Jewitt Elementary, Constable
Edward Finney School, and Victory
School. Soprano Ana Toumine, an
alumna of the 2022 Digital Emerging
Artists Program, developed a
workshop curriculum that used
music, language, and movement



to help elementary and junior high students learn how the stories we tell connect us to the people and places in our lives.

Students learned about one another by sharing and celebrating the many places they come from and the many languages they speak, and learned about how opera is enjoyed by people in many different countries and cultures.

Each workshop culminated with a performance of a one-actor musical play that Ana wrote for Vancouver's 2023 International Children's Festival; an autobiographical story about music, imagination, fear, and learning to understand big feelings.



Manitoba Opera is committed to changing people's lives through the glory of opera. Beyond our performances on the mainstage, we serve our community through the ongoing development of our practices, procedures, policies, and programming.

Through investments in our people, advancement in our technology, and the development of inclusive practices, the Board of Trustees and staff work together to create an invigorated opera company for the 21st century that resonates with our community.

#### **Board of Trustees**

After completing four full terms, Lori Yorke retired from the Board of Trustees. Having served since 2016, Lori was elected treasurer in 2019, sitting on the Executive Committee and providing her expertise as the chair of the Finance Committee. Lori was an ardent ambassador for Manitoba Opera during her tenure.

Maria Mitousis concluded her service on the Board of Trustees after four full terms, sitting on the Executive Committee as Vice Chair for three seasons from 2017 to 2020. Maria also served on the Governance Committee from 2016 to 2024, assuming the role of chair of the committee for the 2021/22 season. Maria was influential in the development of various policies and processes throughout her time on the board.

This year also sees the retirement of Daniela Ignat, a member since 2016. Since 2017 Daniela has been an integral part of the Finance Committee, most notably assisting the organization in setting up its first staff pension plan in 2022.

Manitoba Opera is grateful to Lori, Maria, and Daniela for their advocacy, leadership and guidance, and they will be missed around the board table.

At the 2023/24 Annual General Meeting, members re-elected Ray Karasevich, Terence Sakohianisaks Douglas, Flavia Fernandez Fabio, Lana Maidment, Judith Chambers, Keith Sinclair and David Folk. Returning trustees in mid-terms are Sandy Chahal, Nupur Kumari, John Pacak, Charlene Ord, and Grant Suderman.

Joining the Board as a new trustee is Andrea McLandress, Director of Public Services and Procurement Canada. We also have past Board members who will be joining us again for another term of service: Dr. Bill Pope, who previously served

on the Board in the 1990s and again from 2014 to 2022; Luisa Matheson, who served from 2014 to 2020; and Paul Bruch-Wiens, who previously served on the Board from 2019 to 2023.

The staff looks forward to another successful season under the trustees' exemplary leadership, and to welcoming the new trustees to the Board.

#### Professional Development

Development staff concluded the season by attending The Western Canadian Fundraising





Conference, a three-day conference in Winnipeg for nonprofit leaders and fundraisers. Throughout the year, Development staff also attended various lunchtime learning sessions and webinars provided by the Association of Fundraising Professionals and ArtsReach.

Over the course of the season, Darlene Ronald, Director of Marketing, attended online presentations by organizations including Arts Reach and Business/ Arts that focused primarily on purchasing trends, audience loyalty, and attracting audiences in today's market.

Tania Douglas served as a member of the Manitoba Philanthropy Awards Selection Committee and on the Board of Directors of Continuity Care, a social services organization.



#### **Staff Roster**

The 2023/24 season marked another year of evolution for the staff complement that supports the mission of the company.

Anna Schwartz (student ambassador, 2022/23) joined the organization in the role of executive assistant in June 2023 and departed in September 2023 to pursue a development role at the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra. During Anna's time, she assisted the General Director & CEO, as well as the Director of Operations, with administrative and research support, while managing meetings for the Board and various committees within the organization.

In July 2023, Manitoba Opera welcomed Ashley Schneberger (student ambassador, 2022/23) to the team as the development and grant assistant, and she worked closely with her colleagues on prospect research, grant writing,



and the Endowment Campaign. When Anna vacated her position, Ashley transitioned into the executive assistant role, providing administrative support to the General Director & CEO, as well as the Director of Operations, and managing Board operations.

As part of the Opera Access and Community Pricing Initiative, Alice Macgregor (student ambassador, 2022/23) was hired as the ticket coordinator from October to November 2023. This initiative focused on providing both free and subsidized tickets through community outreach to Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North and focused on community members who may not otherwise be able to experience opera. During her time at the opera. Alice made connections with over 90 community-based organizations.





Beginning in February 2024, Nadine Hink joined the company as the development assistant, providing support to the Director of Development on the Power of Voice Endowment Campaign. Nadine is assisting with prospect research, administrative support, and creation of campaign materials.


#### **Building Bridges**

The 2023/24 season marked the fourth year of Manitoba Opera's Building Bridges project, designed to develop strong connections with Indigenous communities in Manitoba. Supported by Opera America's Innovation Grant Program, the company continued its work, building on the foundation laid by Rhonda Forgues of Spirited Ways Consulting, who served as a consultant for two seasons on the project.

In May 2023, Manitoba Opera became a signatory to the Winnipeg Indigenous Accord, committing to four Calls of Action through our 2023/24 season. Through the completion of *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North*, the following commitment has been completed:

In support of Call to Action 83, Manitoba Opera continued their support of the *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North* project. *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North* explores a little-known chapter in Louis Riel's life and focuses on the beauty and love of the homeland and of its people, with a focus on the role women have played in this history. Presented in the fall of 2023, this production became the first Indigenous-led opera presented on a Canadian opera mainstage.



The Building Bridges Committee reported on this goal in its recent submission to the Accord's annual report and reaffirmed our commitment to the remaining goals:

## IN SUPPORT OF CALL TO ACTION 92I, MANITOBA OPERA WILL:

Begin the process of establishing an Indigenous Advisory Council to ensure Indigenous peoples are involved in the organization's decision-making processes.

# IN SUPPORT OF CALL TO ACTION 92II, MANITOBA OPERA WILL:

Develop and implement an Indigenous Procurement Policy.

Complete a review of existing human resource and governance policies and procedures to identify and implement changes to increase the recruitment and retention of Indigenous employees, board members, volunteers, performers, and audience members.

# IN SUPPORT OF CALL TO ACTION 92111, MANITOBA OPERA WILL:

Create an ongoing Indigenous education and awareness strategy, which will include undertaking a needs analysis by comparing existing training opportunities or resources to the employees' and board members' existing knowledge, and then bridging that gap with specific learning opportunities.





# MANITOBA OPERA PARTICIPATES IN WOMEN IN MUSICAL LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

The 2023/24 season marked Manitoba Opera's second year as a partner in the Women in Musical Leadership (WML) program. This program seeks to nurture the development of female and non-binary conductors. Currently, less than three percent of music director positions in Canadian orchestras are occupied by Canadian women. As a program partner, Manitoba Opera has committed to offering mentorship in this program through to the 2024/25 season.

This year, we were pleased to welcome Monica Chen and Eve Legault as WML Assistant Conductors. Monica was on the *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North* team and Eve joined the *Carmen* team.

Vancouver-born Monica Chen is Assistant Conductor of the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, as well as Music Director of the University of Manitoba Symphony Orchestra and Sistema Winnipeg program.

Monica completed two masters, one in Orchestral Conducting from UBC studying with Dr. Jonathan Girard and the other in violin performance from Indiana University studying with Mimi Zweig.

Hailing from Gatineau, Quebec, Eve became the first woman to conduct her hometown orchestra, the Orchestre Symphonique de Gatineau and is now the Principal Conductor of the Pembroke Symphony Orchestra in Ontario.

WML is a three-year program led by Tapestry Opera that is designed to collectively develop the next generation of female and non-binary conductors and music directors in Canada. WML provides conductors the opportunity to assist, observe, conduct, and build experience within a range of organizations in symphonic, chamber, operatic and contemporary repertoire. This provides conductors with the professional experience and training that will enable them to take the podium anywhere in the world.

"Last spring, I had the chance to work with Maestro Tyrone Paterson as an assistant conductor on Carmen. This three-week experience was my first placement in the WML program, and I loved every minute of it," says Eve. "Maestro Paterson is a wonderful mentor. He gave me the chance to conduct often during staging rehearsals, which was extremely valuable experience. I felt very appreciated by the whole team as I also served as the French diction coach on this production. There was a true sense of team spirit during rehearsals, and I hope to have the chance to come back soon."







### FINANCE REPORT

Manitoba Opera posted an operating surplus of \$5,000 following an internal transfer of \$98,849 to its board-designated Operating Reserve Fund. As of May 31, 2024, the Reserve Fund has a balance of \$267,479, up from \$168,630, to support its activities and programs for FY 2025.

#### **GRANTS**

Operational funding from the Canada Council for the Arts, Manitoba Arts Council, and the Winnipeg Arts Council remained unchanged at \$255,000, \$370,000, and \$127,600, respectively.

Other Grants included \$100.000 from the Government of Canada's Community Services Recovery Fund, \$12,560 from the National Creation Fund at Canada's National Arts Centre, to support workshopping of Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North. \$23.357 from Opera America's Innovation Grant Program to support the Building Bridges program, \$10,000 from the City of Winnipeg to support operations, and \$5,000 from Councilor Brian Mayes to support the translation of Opera Storytime into Anishinaabemowin.

# GRANTS & SPONSORSHIPS FOR LI KEUR: RIEL'S HEART OF THE NORTH

Manitoba Opera was the recipient of special grants and sponsorships to support the premiere of *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North* which resulted in \$1,030,500. We received \$435,000 from BMO, our largest corporate gift to date. There was \$414,000 provided through grants

and foundation support from the Province of Manitoba's Art, Culture, and Sport in Community Fund, The Winnipeg Foundation, **TELUS Indigenous Communities** Fund, The Asper Foundation, and Thomas Sill Foundation. The corporate community, including the Richardson Foundation, Power Corporation of Canada, Wawanesa Insurance, Canada Life, Manitoba Liquor & Lotteries, IG Wealth Management, Payworks, Red River Co-op, Stantec, Taylor McCaffrey LLP, Travel Manitoba, Qualico, and Pitblado Law generously contributed a total of \$181,500.

#### **BOX OFFICE**

The world premiere of *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North*, and the return of the beloved classic, *Carmen*, marked the highlights of FY 2024. Audience rebuilding remains a top priority for the organization as subscription figures this season are still just 60% of pre-pandemic levels. However, the community response for single tickets for both productions resulted in our best box office revenues since the pandemic. Revenues ended at \$669,821, which is an increase of \$264,088 from \$405,733 in FY 2023.

#### SPECIAL EVENTS

Special events this season included three pre-performance dinners for *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North*, the Opening Night Dinner for *Carmen*, and a wine tasting event, In Vino Veritas. Total revenue from special events was \$33,507.

#### **EXPENSES**

Overall, savings were achieved across departmental budgets. Staging the new production of *Li Keur: Riel's Heart of the North* and an increased commitment to the community saw increases in both production expenses and community engagement events and initiatives. These expenses were offset by special fundraising efforts and other cost savings throughout the rest of the company.

#### **ENDOWMENT**

To help solidify the long-term future of Manitoba Opera, the Board of Trustees established an endowment fund through The Winnipeg Foundation. Launched in 2010, gifts made to the A. Kerr Twaddle Robert H. Thorlakson Manitoba Opera Endowment Fund will grow over time and provide a significant stream of revenue to help Manitoba Opera continue to serve the community with meaningful and inspiring programming.

During the fiscal period ending May 31, 2024, the fund grew to \$3,262,801 from \$2,213,323 at the end of FY 2023.

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
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
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
